terey, Mexico. They were heavily laden with blankets, shoes, leather and other needful articles. They brought, also, 118 sacks of powder-about twenty-five or thirty thousand pounds.

HINTS TO FARMERS AND MILLERS .- Careful observation for many years establishes the fact that a horse fed on ground grain will last and work a quarter longer than he will if fed on unground corn, oats, and other whole grain. The first named will be as young and as serviceable when sixteen years old as the latter will be at twelve. Not only the grinding teeth of a horse wear out prematurely by this excess of jaw work in grinding hard corn, but the mill often barely cracks the kernels, and only the moiety of the nourishment in the grain is extracted in Cotton Buyers, Grocers & Produce its passage through the alimentary canat. While the muscular labor of grinding so much grain in the lifetime of a horse is considerable, the loss in food consumed is far greater than the market value of the animal, by its not being fully digested. The loss of feeding unground corn to oxen, cows and hogs is generally more than in feeding of horses.
