TELEGRAPHIC.

From the 2d Edition.

From Virginia. Telegraphed expressly for the Bulletin. RICHMOND, May 6.

An Official Letter from Williamsburg, just received, states that the enemy pursued our Cavalry Pickets nearly to Town, on Sunday last, but they were easily repulsed by the 9th Guard, under command of Brig. Genl. McLaws.

The enemy lost a piece of artillery and two of their men, who were captured. The 4th Virginia Cavalry, under command of Lt. Col. Wyckham, made a handsome charge upon the enemy.

An Official Dispatch from Staunton, dated 5th inst., states that the enemy evacuated Harrisonburg on Monday, and that it is now in the possession of our Cavalry.

Later from New Orleans. The Jackson Mississippi of the 1st inst., acknowledges the receipt of N. Orleans papers of Tuesday last and furnishes the following particulars:

The authorities of New Orleans held out to the fast in their stubborn and heroic refusal to lower the Flag of their adoption. The guns at Fort Jackson were spiked before the Garrison surrendered.

Fort Pike was evacuated and every thing intact abandoned. Farragut [the Federalist] sent a communication to the Mayor and Council, on the 29th ult., complaining of their refusal to hand down the Confederate Flag, etc.

The Evening Delta of Wednesday says all the Confederate Flags in the City have been lowered and Federal Flags are flying from all the public buildings under the protection of the troops.

The Federals were expected to take military possession of the city on Wednesday. The commander of the French steamer Milton, anchored opposite the city, notified Farragut that only 48 hours notice of his intention to bombard was ridiculous and demanded sixty days.

From Richmond. The Legislature met yesterday in Extra Session. A message from Gov. Letcher, received to-day says it is his deliberate opinion that the Constitution act is unconstitutional, but in consequence of the peculiar condition of affairs existing at the time of its passage, he forbears to debate the question.

The Governor says there is no occasion for dependency. Our successes, so far, have been more brilliant than those that attended our ancestors in the origin of their great struggle. He urges a vigorous prosecution of the war. That Maryland must be redeemed and the North must be made feel the evils of the war before we can hope for a permanent peace.

He says the Counties in Virginia overrun by the enemy contain a slave population of 80,000, which, at a moderate valuation is worth \$15,000,000. He says he has been informed that the Constitution adopted by the Traitors who committed the Wheeling Convention, has been rejected by the people to whom it was submitted. That the clause providing for gradual Emancipation was also rejected.

Executive Department of North Carolina. ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, Raleigh, March 22d, 1862. GENERAL ORDER. ALL NEW COMPANIES OF N. C. Volunteers must be tendered directly to the State, otherwise the bounty authorized by the ordinance of the Convention to raise North Carolina's quota of troops will not be paid to them, as the law does not allow it. The Companies so tendered will be organized into Regiments by the State, the commissioned officers of which shall elect their field officers. The bounty will not be paid until the Company has been accepted by their arrival in Camp. If no organization of Regiments or Battalions will be recognized unless the same is done by authority of the State and in compliance with its laws. The bounty authorized by the Convention to raise for immediate field service should have no more than such men as can carry in their knapsacks. It is desirable that those who are to be organized should be provided with additional articles not necessarily be lost if brought.
