GENERAL ORDERS, NO. 4,

ADJUTANT AND INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, Richmond, February 8, 1865.

COMMANDERS OF ARMIES, DE-

partments or districts, will enforce the following Act of Congress in all sections in which the enemy may be advancing. They will hold subordinate officers, charged with the duty of carrying out its provisions, responsible for its proper execution:

An Act to regulate the Destruction of Property under Military Necessity, and to provide for Indemnity therefor.

SECTION 1. The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That the military authorities of the Confederate army are hereby authorized and directed to destroy cotton, tobacco, military and naval stores, or other property of any kind whatever, which may aid the enemy in the prosecution of the war, when necessary to prevent the same, or any part thereof, from falling into the hands of the enemy.

[Approved March 17, 1862.]

II. Officers will be calm and considerate in the performance of the duty enjoined by these orders. They will not be justified in the destruction of property, unless the necessity therefor be reasonably established.

III. As far as practicable, notice of the approach of danger should be given owners of property, and every precaution for its removal that circumstances will permit should be taken.

GENERAL ORDERS, NO. 122,

ADJUTANT AND INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, Richmond, Sept. 11, 1863.

THE FOLLOWING ACT OF CON-

gress is published for the information of all concerned:

Every person, not subject to the rules and articles of war, who shall procure or entice a soldier of the Confederate States to desert, or who shall purchase from any soldier his arms, uniform, clothing, or any part thereof, shall, upon legal conviction, be fined at the discretion of the court having cognizance of the same, in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, and be imprisoned not exceeding one year.

THE DISCIPLINE AND EFFICIENCY

of the army have been greatly impaired by men leaving their proper commands to join others, in which they find service more agreeable.

This practice, almost as injurious in its consequences as the crime of desertion, by the Articles of War, exposes the offender to a similar punishment, and subjects the officer receiving him to dismissal from the army.

It is therefore declared that the provisions of General Order No. 2 of this date, army headquarters, apply to such men as have left their proper commands and joined others without being regularly transferred. They will receive the pardon promised in that order upon complying with its conditions, or suffer the consequences attached to neglecting it.

The names of such absentees will be forthwith reported to these headquarters by the officers with whom they are serving, and immediate measures taken to return them to their proper commands.

As soon as practicable an inspection will be made, and charges will be preferred against those who neglect to enforce this order.
