GENERAL ORDERS, NO. 4. ADJUTANT AND INSP'R GENERAL'S OFFICE,)

Richmond, February 8, 1865. COMMANDERS OF ARMIES, DE-1 . partments or districts, will enforce the following Act of Congress in all sections in which the enemy may be advancing.

An Act to regulate the Destruction of Propcrty under Military Necessity, and to pro-

vair jor Indemnity thereof. The Congress of the Contederate States of America do enact, That the military authorities of the Confederate army are hereby authorized and directed to destroy cotton, tobacco, milnary and naval stores, or other property of any kind whatever, which may aid the enemy in the prosecution of the war, when necessary to prevent the same, or any part thereof, from falling into the hands of the enemy."

[Approved March 17, 1862.]

II. Officers will be calm and considerate a the performance of the day enjoined by the so orders. They will not be justified in the destruction of property, unless the necessity therefor be reasonably established.

III. As far as practicable, notice of the approach of danger should be given owners of property, and every precaution for its removal that circumstances will permit should be taken.

Ho'QRS ARMIES OF CONFEDERATE STATES.) February 11th, 1865.

General Orders, No. 2. N ENTERING, UPON THE CAMPAIGN about to open, the General-in-Chief feels assured that the soldiers who have so long and so nobly borne the hard; ships and dangers of the war, require no exhortation to respond to the calls of honor

With the liberty transmitted by their forefathers they have inherited the spirit to

The choice between war and abject submission is before them.

To such a proposal brave men with arms in their hands can have but one answer. They cannot barter manhood for peace, nor the right of self-government for life or . But justice to them requires a sterner ad-

monition to those who have abandoned their comrades in the hour of peril. A last opportunity is offered them to wipe

out the disgrace and escape the punishment of their crimes. By authority of the President of the

Confederate States, a pardon is announced to such deserters and men improperly absent, as shall return to the commands to which they belong within the shortest possible time, not exceeding twenty days from the publication of this order, at the headquarters of the department in which they

Those who may be prevented by interruption of communications, may report within the time specified to the nearest enrolling officer or other officer on duty, to be forwarded as soon as practicable, and upon presenting a certificate from such officer showing compliance with this requirement, will receive the pardon hereby offered.

Those who have deserted to the service of the enemy, or who have deserted after havhood who have in their possession the enemy, or who have deserted after hav-or a nee Property of any kind belonging ing been once pardoned for the same offence, and those who shall desert, or absent themselves without authority after the publication of this order, are excluded from its benefits. Nor does the offer of pardon extend to other offences than desertion and absence without permission.

By the same authority, it is also declared that no general amnesty will again be granted, and those who refuse to accept the pardon now offered, or who shall hereafter desert or absent themselves without leave, shall suffer such punishment as the Courts may impose, and no application for clemency will be entertained.

Taking new resolution from the fate which our enemies intended for us, let every man devote all his energies to the common de-

Our resources, wisely and vigorously em-ployed, are ample, and with a brave army,

sustained by a determined and united people, success, with God's assistance, cannot be doubtful. The advantages of the enemy will have but little value if we do not permit them to

Grom Alabama .- Selma Captured.

Augusta, April 3 .- Mobile papers of the atest dates, represent the negroes enlisting in large numbers in that city.

The train captured on the Florida railroad on the 27th ult , had several bags of delayed mail from Richmond for Mobile and the west. Iwenty thousand dollars worth of postage stamps for Mobile was captured. The Southern Express lost the contents of their safe and the packages for the trip.

Selma was attacked on Sunday evening, 2d inst., by the enemy 9,000 strong, who drove our forces from their entrenchments and turned the left flank, capturing the city and a large number of prisoners. The Yan-

kees still occupy the place. Thomas Barrett, president of the City Bank of Augusta, died in this city on Sunday, 2d-inst. He was a prominent banker and citizen, and well known in financial cir-

cles, north and south. Gen Imboden is in this city to-day, very anxious to get to the field in the Valley of Virginia, and begin the campaign.
