

The agricultural department of our paper, this week, we consider particularly interesting; and we invite to it the attention of our readers, especially that large portion of them who are the cultivators of the soil.

Sickness in Charleston.—We learn, from a letter from Charleston to a gentleman in this place, that the yellow fever still rages in that city, and that its ravages have extended to the Island, which is as sickly, in proportion to the number of inhabitants, as the city.

We have re-published from the Western Carolinian, an address from Gen. Forney, candidate on the People's Ticket for Election in this district.

A ticket in favor of John Quincy Adams, as President of the United States, has been formed in Virginia, and comprises the names of "many who now fill, and of others who have heretofore filled honorable stations in the service of that state."

Consistency.—In this state, Mr. Crawford's supporters object to the People's Ticket, because it is not pledged; in Massachusetts, they decry the Adams Ticket, because it is pledged, and have formed an opposition ticket, composed, as they say, of "independent and unpledged men."

The People's Ticket was originally started by the friends of Adams and Calhoun. The object in view, was to unite the friends of the Administration in its support, and to put down the dangerous practice of caucusing; and the electors placed in the ticket, were to be left free to vote in circumstances should require.

We invite every freeman of North-Carolina, whether a friend of Jackson, Adams, Clay or caucus, to read the following circular of Gen. Forney, *claus through*.

There is no one who can wish more heartily for the success of Gen. Jackson, than myself. I prefer him, because I believe he is capable, that he is honest, that he is just, and more identified with the people themselves, than any other candidate.

We might easily show, that the arguments of Gen. Forney are untenable; or rather, that they would prove directly the reverse of what he wishes to; we might point out principles advanced, apparently inconsistent with declarations ac-

companying them; but we have no desire to do so. It is far from our wish to do any thing to disturb the harmony which has hitherto existed among those united in one purpose, the support of the administration against the unjustifiable and ungenerous opposition to it,—although divided in their opinions as to a successor to Mr. Monroe; on the contrary, it will be our object to maintain and strengthen it, and to draw still closer the bonds which unite the friends of the present administration.

At a Convention held at Utica, N. Y. on the 21st ultimo, for the purpose of making a nomination for Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the State, De Witt Clinton received 76 votes out of 120, the number of delegates present, and was consequently nominated—James Tallmadge was put in nomination for Lieutenant Governor. This convention was held in opposition to the caucus nomination at Albany last winter.

By a letter from Newbern, we are informed that the citizens held a meeting in that place on the 23d ultimo, according to a previous notice, for the purpose of nominating a candidate on the People's Ticket, in the place of Wm. S. Blackledge, Esq. who has declined an election; and that the meeting, consisting of near 200 persons, unanimously nominated General Vine Allen, of Newbern, "the same undeviating Republican, (says the letter,) who, in 1816, was chosen Elector, and gave his vote to Mr. Monroe, against the same faction with which we have now to contend."

Some politicians in Massachusetts lately got up a list of candidates for electors, under the imposing title of "The Independent Ticket," and headed with the honored names of Eustis and Brooks, but it was generally believed that the ticket would be supported by the friends of Mr. Crawford, under the impression that if successful, the electors would vote for that gentleman.

We are authorized to state, that Governor Eustis and Governor Brooks decline being considered candidates for the office of Electors of President and Vice President of the United States.

The Richmond Enquirer announces the death of Mr. Taylor: A Great Man has fallen in Israel. The death of John Taylor of Caroline, is confirmed. The great lawyer—the profound politician—the friend of the constitution in its original purity—he who served as a member of the State Legislature in the dark days of '98 and '99—who formerly shone as a member of the United States' Senate, and who has been clothed anew with the confidence of Virginia in the same high capacity—he, who both by precept and example, has scattered a flood of light over agriculture, the staple occupation of this people, "the chosen people" of the land, has suddenly descended to the tomb, "full of years and full of honor!"—Let Virginia weep over the ashes of the illustrious patriot.

[N. B. This profound politician and illustrious patriot, the friend of the constitution, &c. who had enjoyed the best opportunities of knowing the several can-

didates for the office of President, most emphatically, and only a short time before his death, declared a fixed preference for John Quincy Adams.
