Killed. A negro man was killed on the track of the Wilmington and Raleigh Railroad, this morning, a few minutes after six. The negro was lying immediately across the track at a curve in the Road, near the residence of Gen. McKrae. He was not seen in time to stop the train, which went over him killing him immediately. He belonged to Mr. Brown, of Smithville. He was employed on board the steamboat Zephyr.

A DUEL.—A friendly duel, says the San Joaquin Republican, took place on Monday afternoon, at Monquimune Hill, between Mr. Loforge, County Clerk of Calaveras, and Mr. Dooly. They chose the unique manner of spouting water at each other, to cool their wounded honor. One combatant supplied himself with the hose of the Union Water Company, the other with that of the Massachusetts Company. Marking the distance, which was about twenty feet, they commenced playing upon each other. The combatants understood the cool application manfully for about ten minutes, when Mr. D., thinking discretion the better part of valor, caved in. An article in the Edinburg Review states that the Mormons keep up a perpetual emigration fund, amounting last year to \$34,000, to pay the outfit and passage to those converts in foreign lands who may be unable to pay their own expenses. The additions to the community have not been less than 3,000 a year from that source, which, with the increase of population among themselves, and the results of proselytism in the United States, bids fair to create a powerful and dangerous element among us. At the rate of increase realized during the last five years, in five years more they will reach 60,000 inhabitants, the number required to enable them to admission to the Union, and to all the immunities in reference to local laws and institutions of a sovereign State. The extent of their missionary operations, as represented in the article referred to is astonishingly great.

Town Ordinances.

At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners for the Town of Charlotte, held this 12th day of August, 1854, the following Ordinances were unanimously passed, viz: Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners for the Town of Charlotte, That the owners of lots in said Town fronting on Trade and Tryon Streets be required to curb the side walks in front of their lots, with stone or heavy oak timber, and the space between the curb and the lot be raised with gravel or sand so as to make a convenient alleyway; and any owner of lots in said town situated as aforesaid, failing to observe this ordinance within ten days from its publication, shall be liable to the penalty of Fifty Dollars, to be recovered before the Intendant of said Town, and shall also be liable for the cost of its improvement.
