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Cheap Wash for Cottages of wood.

For the outside of wooden cottages, barns, out-buildings, fences, &c., where economy is important, the following wash is recommended:

Take a clean barrel of fresh quick lime, and slake it by pouring over it boiling water sufficient to cover it 4 or 5 inches deep, and stirring it till slacked.

When quite slacked, dissolve it in water and add 2 lbs. sulphate of zinc (white vitrol) which may be had of any druggists, and which in a few weeks will cause the whitewash to harden on the wood work.

The Capture of Bomarsund.

The despatches which have now been received from Sir Charles Napier, and the more ample details furnished by our own correspondents with reference to the capture of the forts at Bomarsund, have doubtless been read with the liveliest interest by all classes of the public.

The first point was the disembarkation of the troops, which took place on the morning of the 9th. The landing place chosen by the General and the Admiral was a bay of about three miles in breadth, situated to the southwest of the forts, and at a distance of 2,500 yards from the western fort, which is called Fort Teze.

We are not informed at what range this fire was opened, and the distance was probably greater than it would have been if the place had been approached by regular siege operations.

The most obvious inference to be drawn from the success of this attack is, that the Russian forts, if they are generally constructed on the same principles and of the same materials as those of Bomarsund, cannot withstand for any lengthened time a close fire of heavy guns, even when those guns are very few in number, and that the difficulty of fighting in encamped batteries is greatly increased by the fire of Minie rifles, which can now be directed with great precision into the embrasures.

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Town Ordinances.

At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners for the Town of Charlotte, held this 12th day of August, 1854, the following Ordinances were unanimously passed, viz:

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners for the Town of Charlotte, That the owners of lots in said Town fronting on Trade and Tryon Streets be required to curb the side walks in front of their lots, with stone or heavy oak timber, and the space between the curb and the sidewalk to be paved with gravel or sand so as to make a convenient walkway; and any one owning lots in said town situated as aforesaid, failing to observe this ordinance within ten days from its publication, shall be liable to the penalty of Fifty Dollars, to be recovered before the Justices of said Town, and shall also be liable for the cost of said improvement.

Whereas, the Central Rail Road Company have acted in every bad faith towards the citizens of Charlotte, in rendering impassable one of the principal streets of said Town, and in their refusing or neglecting for the space of two years or more to make a bridge across said cut.

Be it therefore ordained by the Board of Commissioners for the Town of Charlotte, That the Justices of said Town forthwith cause to be built a good and substantial bridge over the Central Rail Road at the deep cut crossing the Street leading by the Methodist Church, and known upon the plot of said Town as Seventh Street.

Notice to Mechanics. THE undersigned Committee will receive proposals until the 1st day of October next, for building a CHURCH, on the S. & C. Rail road, 7 miles from Charlotte, of the following dimensions, viz: 75 feet long by 40 in width; 14 feet from floor to ceiling; by doors, 4 ft. wide and 7 ft. high, 17 windows, 18 lights 12 by 14; with shutters one large window in front, 18 lights 12 by 18, with circular top Gothic finish; and shutters; with 50 feet long, 20 inches in height, neatly finished, with comfortable backs 18 inches high.
