FOREIGN NEWS.

The War.

The Departure of the Crimean Expedition. The Crimea expeduion has sailed. It is the largest naval expedition in the annals of warfare, and consisted of seven hundred ships, carrying at once 74,000 men, with horses, guns, pontoons, gabiones, tents, provisions, and all the materials of war.

The fleet musters 25 000 sailors and 3 000 cannon, while the land force comprises 20,000 English, 35,000 Turks, 10,000 Egyptians, 5,000 Tunisians and 4,000 of other nationalijes.

On the 3 rult., the greater part of the British squadron with the English troops on board, left Varna, and on the 5th the French Gen. St. Arnaud, and the Turks left to join the British at Fidanisi or Serpent's island, off the mouth of the Danube, opposite to Eupatoria in the Crimea.

The debarkation will take place at Point Baba near the mouth of the river Katchka, where there is fifteen fanthours of water. Once landed, the alhes will entrench themselves. The Russian army must next be beaten in the field, or the allies will necupy the heights above the city. From the sea Furt Constantine, mounting one hundred and ten guns, will be the principle object of atteck. A position has been discovered whence the Russian iller can be enfilleded, and either set on fire in the harbor or be compelled to come out and fight -tions.

Prince Menschikoff personally conducts the detence of Schastopol. He attaches great importance. to the fortifications of Oczakoff and Kherson, and some thousand men are occupied in strongthing those places. Continued reinforcements arrive at Odessa and pass on. 60,000 men are slid to be in camp, besides a full goorison in the mity. A son of tolin P. 
