### Texas Items.

The State Attorney General has decided that in mases where files have been made upon lands subsequently included in the reserves of the Pacific Railroad, these cannot be raised for the purpose of making other files on the same land. If raised the lands revert to the reserve.

The Austin State Gazette says the heavy winds and rains have materially damaged the cotton crop of that vicinity and down the Colorado valley.

The Gazette learns that Capt. Marcy, having made the suitable selections of land for the Caddoes and Camanches, has left for Washington to make his report to the Government.

The Indians have again been committing depredations at the Fort Mason settlement.

Large numbers of emigrants are moving into Peter's Colony, and settling on the fine lands within ite limits.

The residence of Mr. Armstrong, in Lavaca, was struck by lightning some days ago. The Commercial says :

It struck the top of the house, passed down through the roof and struck a bed, which it tore all to pieces and drove one of the posts into the ground, besides doing a good deal of damage. Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong were out in the yard at the moment, and did not receive any injury.

The fall emigration to Texas has commenced with great force. Every steamship carries thither a number of persons who intend to settle, and many are wending their way by land.

CROPS IN TEXAS .- The Brazoria Planter of the 27th ultimo referring to the effects of the late storm, says the planters of that country have suffered very severely. It thinks not more than a third or half a crop of sugar will be made, and cotton will not greatly exceed a fourth of an average yield.

CHEROKEE COUNTY .- The Cherokee Sentinel says the corn crop of that county has turned out much better than was expected. The yield has been abundant. In relation to the cotton crop, that paper says that the general shortness of the cotton crop, in consevuence of the severity of the drought, naturally justifies the anticipation of an advance in prices.

Cass County .- The H-rald, of the 26th ult., says that if the picking reason should prove as good as that of last year, the cotton crop will be much larger than has been anticipated.

TRAVIS COUNTY .- The State Gezette, of the 80th ultimo, savs:

The violent winds of last week, succeeded by the heavy rains which have been falling for several days past, have materially damaged the cotion crop of this vicinity, and down the Colorado Valley. The cotton which opened during the dry weather of August and September, hanging looseiv in the bolls at the time when the storm began, large quantities were blown out upon the ground, and the rains following immediately, completely covered it with dirt. We think we may safely say that twenty per cent of the crop has been destroyed.
