" It was about 9 o'clock in the evening-we had just taken fresh horses, and we were descending a mountain over a very dangerous road, a portion of which skirted the very brink of a precipice, but we were hardly a mile and a halt from Nevada, when the driver, mistaking a large stump for a shadow, (the moon being very bright,) drove heedlessly forward, and striding the obstacle, broke the pole of our coach. Immediately the horses began running at a terrible rate, the driver losing all control. We braced ourselves as well as we could, momentarily anticipating the shock of an upset, us soon as the vehicle should strike full against one of the mony stumps which lay in our course. One gentleman jumped from the stage, and was hurt severely; the rest of us sat as firmly as possible, attering not a word, but awaiting breathlessly the catustrophe which we felt must ensue. On we went, hurrying toward a frightful precipice, which some of the party knew was but a few rods in advance of us, when, providentially, the horses swerved snadenly from the road, and dashed into the woods. The few minutes' running time seemed weeks to us, but at length two immense' stumps presented themselves; the first was grozed sufficiently to tilt the vehicle upon the other, where it became wedged, whilst the horses, disengaged, dashed headlong forward. There we were 'fix d;' the windows of the stage about a foot from the ground, and we so firmly braced against each other that the shock of stoppage had been scarcely felt. Gen. Wool scrambled out of the window first, and we followed as speedily as possible; The poor driver had been thrown twenty feet and lay speechless, his collar bone broken. We apprehended some of the 'insiders' must be severely hurt, but happily all escaped with a few scratches, save only the gentleman who had jumped out and who was found senseless on the road some distance back."

#### The Eastern Survey.

The Beaufort Halcyon of the 28th ult., conraids the interesting and able Report of Major Gwynn on the survey for the extension of the North Carolina Railroad to Beaufort. We have room this week only for a brief notice. The survey appears to have been conducted with a desire to reconcile all the conflicting interests connected with the terminus at the Harbor, and the recommendations in the report seem to have that end in view. The following paragraph gives the distance of the lines surveyed, and the estimates of the cost for building and equipping the Road.

"The length of the line as surveyed from Goldsborough to Gallant's Point is 99 miles ; to Beau- ble Drug Stores in the United States and Canada. ort 99.6 miles; to Lennoxville 105.36 miles; to Shepard's Point 95,84 miles; and the cost of these respective lines are \$1,687,890, \$1,643,690, \$1,-754.047 and \$1.663.118."

To concentrate the capital, and to invite the energies of the greatest number of those personally interested in the terminus, the report advises a terminus that will embrace all points-that is, a Road to the town of Beaufort and also to Shepard's Point, with collateral branches from these lines to places on the Harbor which they do not touch; thus in effect, making the whole Harbor the terminus, and every point a terminated point. it not thought advisable to complete the whole circle at the outset, the report recommends that the are of a circle, or the branch to Beaufort, be first constructed.

M.j. G. reports the distances of deep water from the main land to be as follows: at Shepard's Point 3 200 feet, at the town of Beaufort 6,270 teet, at Gallant's Point 5,610 feet. Hellsboro' Recorder.
