The sight was strange beyond description. -French, English, and Russian officers were walking about saluting each other courteously as they passed, and occasionally entering into conversation, and a constant interchange of little civilities, such as offering and receiving cigar-lights, was going on in each little group. Some of the Russian officers were evidently men of high rank and breeding. Their polished manners contrasted remarkably with their plain and rather coarse clothing. They were, with few exceptions, the invariable long gray coat over their uniforms .-The French officers were all en grande tonne, and offered a striking contrast to the British, who wore uncouth head-dresses, cat skin coats, and nondescript paletots.

While the men were engaged in placing the dead bodies upon litters and carrying them away, a lively conversation sprang up among the officers, in which the Russians indulged in a little bandinage. One asked when the allies were "coming in to take the place;" another, "when they thought of going away." Some congratulated the allies upon the excellent opportunity they had of getting a good look at Sebastopol, as the chance of a nearer view, except on similar occasions was not, in their opinion, very probable. One officer asked a private confidentially in English how many men were sent into the trenches? "Begorra, only 7,000 a night, and a wake covering party of 10 000," was the ready reply. The efficer laughed and turned away. At one time a Russian with a litter stopped by a dead body, and put it into the litter. He looked round for a contrade to help him. A Zou we at once advanced with much grace and hited it, to the infinite amosement of the bystanders; but the joke was not long lived, as a Russ an brusquely came up and helped to carry off his dead comrade.

The Allies seemed to have improved the cexcellent opportunity" to see the town. They reported large bodies of soldiery in the streets, assembled at the corners and in the public places. They thought them ordered out to make a show The Russians denied that Prince Menschikoff was dead, but they admitted that Admiral I-termin was killed. He was one of the principal officers engaged in the destruction of the Turkish fl-t at Smoor, and the Czar had reward d him by giving him an order of St. George of higher distinction than that worn by Prince Menchikoff, and of a class which is generally accorded only to success tal generals who have conducted an army and closed a triumphant compaign. A distinguished looking man, Prince Bartanoki complained that he was likely to be deprived of his cruise in his pleasure vacht this year by the war,

The armistice was over about 3 o'clock. Scarceby had the white flag disappeared behind the parapet of the Mamelon before a round shot from the unilars' battery went slap through one of the embrasures of the Russian work, and dashed up a great pillar of earth inside. The Russians at or ce replied, and the noise of cannon soon re-echoed through the ravines.

Use of Guano.

There is one experiment which we would be glad to see fairly tried, on different soils and in different seasons. We would be glad to see common stable manure and guano applied, so as to be as nearly equal in strength as possible, to two or more partions of land, lying side by side, and these afterwards left untouched, for several years, so as to observe the comparative durability of the effects of the two manures. Some trials of this kind have been made, we believe, but we have seen no account of any which could be regarded as satisfactory. It is not unlikely, we think, that the effects of the stable manure might be traced longer than those of the guano, and so far the former might be called the more durable of the two: but so long as a soil abjectly poor may be made by means of guano, to produce a crop which will pay for it, and a fair stand of clover into the bargain, we think there need be no lamentations over its want of durability. When a piece of land is once well bet in cover, it must, as we have already said, be the farmer's own fault, if he does not contrive to make it the foundation of a durable improve-

There can be no doubt that some vegetable productions may be so forced or stimulated by guano, as greatly to injure if not utterly destroy them. Mr. Wm. H. Grant, a skilful gardener of this vicinity, informs us that he was induced, soon after the first appearance of guano in this country, to make a trial of it upon some very valuable rose bushes. The effect was soon manifest, the bushes grew enormously, and were covered with flowers in astonishing profusion. Contrary to his better second time. What he had foreboded took place. In the case of annual plants, where there can be no reaction, the same danger cannot exist. With regard to such, when would by no means be understood as recommending it to be used to the exclusion of all others .-We would have the farmer make manure in every way, and from every thing, that can possibly be made available. We would have experiments made too with every sort of chemical compound, and we think there is no reason to despair of a blessed immortality. eventually discovering an artificial fertilizer, even superior to guano, which may be made in any quantity, and at much less cost.
