Answeren .- What is saleratus ? Wood is burned to ashes, ashes are lixivated-lev is the result. Loy is evaporated by boiling-black salts is the residium. The salts undergo purification by fire, and the potash of commerce is obtained. By another process we change potash into pearlash. Now put these in sacks and place them over a distillery wash tub, where the fermentation evolves carbonic acid gas, and the pearlash absorbs it and is rendered solid ; the product being heavier, drier and whiter than the pearlash. It is now saleratus. How much salts of ley and carbonic acid a human stomach can bear and remain healthy, is a question for a saleratus eater. Some people say saleratus will not harm the stomach. It is a ley.

To SPORTSMEN .- Wash your gun barrels in spirits of turpentine by dipping a rag or sponge fastened on your gun rod into the liquid, and swabbing them out three or four times, when they will be cleared from all impurities, and can be used almost instantly as the turpentine will evaporate and leave the barrels dry ; even if they are a little moist it will not prevent their going off like water. After being washed thus, there is no danger of rust as when water is used. I am an old experienced gunner, and have practiced this for years, and found it useful. Spirits of turpentine can be procured at all country store, and a small quantity sufficith,-Scientific American.


