## THE PACIFIC RAILROAD.

In the Senate on the 17th, the bill to construct the Pacific Railroad was discussed and then postponed till December next. Below we give a sketch of the discussion on the occasion :

Mr Benjamin of La. considered it obvious that the Senate cannot agree on any route. With a diminished treasury, loans and prospective expenses, he could not think that Senators imagine they can pass the bill. He would, therefore, move, as a test vote, that the further consideration of the subject be postponed till December.

Mr Gwin of Cal. would consider such a vote an indication that the Administration does not intend to give any aid to connect the Atlantic and the Pacific, and as a violation of all the pledges of 1856.

Mr Johnson of Ark. said the spirit of sectionalism is so strong that there is no hope of a route offering justice to the South. He would, therefore vote to postpone the subject till December.

Mr Houston of Texas moved that the Eastern terminus of the road be in Arkansas, opposite Memphis, Tennessee, and spoke in favor of the El Paso route.
