

"The total value of the taxable property in the State for the year 1852 was \$80,754,184. For the year 1857, it was \$183,594,205, or an increase of 125 per cent. in six years. In that time the taxable value of land has run up from an average of 871 cents per acre to 81 47. Negroes have risen in value from \$416 to \$539, and in numbers from 68,795 to 125,240. These statistics are for 1st January, 1857. The present value of property in the State is not far from two hundred and ten millions of dollars.
