

From the report of the Postmaster General we learn that the whole number of post offices in the United States on the 30th June last was 27,977. The number established during the last fiscal year was 2,121, and the number discontinued 730, being an increase of 1,391. The number of postmasters appointed during the year was 8,284. Of these 4,595 were to fill vacancies occassioned by resignation, 398 by removals, 278 by deaths, 292 by change of names and sites, and 2,121 on establishment of new offices. The whole number
