THE GRAPE CULTURE.

Mr Silas McDowell, of Macon county, some years since, mentioned to us a theory which he had matured in his own mind, respecting the fresty region of Western North Carolina. At first we thought his views amounted to nothing more than theory, but a few years observation has convinced us that his views are founded in facts. There does exist a frost-line, above which there JUST RECEIVED A LARGE STOCK OF THE is a thermal current or stratum of atmosphere, in which vegetation is not injured by spring frosts. A year ago, the vegetation of the Tennessee valley was bitten down by a severe frest. The line of its 52 existence did not reach more than about three thousand feet above the level of Tennessee River. A few days after the frost, the valley, through its whole length, presented a most singular appearwere black and erisp, from fro t-kill, while higher upon the mountains' sides every thing remained green and fresh. The line of the destructive frost occured to be as regular along the mountains, as the surface of a lake. We mention this one instance, as being the most striking one within our observation, illustrating Mr McDowell's theory. Since that time, we have taken some pains to gather such facts as might throw light upon this subject, and all we learned go to substantiate, in a most satisfactory manner, everything claimed by Mr McDowell for his thermal theory.

The existence of this thermal belt of atmosphere. is suggestive of one of the resources of our mounhave a warm southern exposure; are of a deep rich soil, and are covered with bickery, ashe, black walnut, maple, black locust, cedar, poplar and onice. the oaks of the southern Alleghanies, sheltered by high mountain peaks, with bold rocky escarpments on the north and north-west. 
