A SARCOPHAGUS FOR HENRY CLAY.—A marble sarcophagus for the remains of Henry Clay, designed to be placed in the base of the monument now being erected in his memory in Lexington, Ky., has been completed in Philadelphia. It is cut out of a solid block of marble from Montgomery county, and is eight feet long, three feet wide across the breast, and two feet and six inches high. The form being that of a coffin, the interior being of a sufficient size to admit the leaden case containing the remains.
