#### MAKING CORN WITHOUT PLOWING. WHITEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 1st, 1859.

To the Editors of the Wilmington Herald: SIRS:-As I thought it might be some interest to some of your readers to give a small experiment which I made on making corn without ploughing, after planting,-I give you the following statement, which, if you deem proper, you can use:

On the 18th of March, 1859, I took possession of a lot near our Court House, containing 1949 square yards, which had been cultivated with other land equally as good or better, and not yielding do here?" more than eight or ten bushels of corn per acre, on which I put 180 lbs. of Mexican guano broadcast, folks to hum! and turned it in about six inches deep, following in every furrow with a bull-tongue plough, and breaking the land from twelve to fifteen inches deep. On the 20th of March, I planted the ground as follows: Rows 4 feet apart; corn 17 inches apart, in drills; I thinned out the corn to one stalk, and hoed it as early as it was safe to thin. I hoed it twice more, each hoeing not more thin. 
