EXCESSIVE LABOR .- In the testimony taken in the matter of limiting the hours of labor of women and children in bleaching and dyeing works in New York, one child said that at times, when they were filling heavy orders, he had not been in bed more than sixteen or eighteen hours a week. Another, 11 years of age, stated that he began work at 12 o'clock on Sunday night, and worked until in endless variety, suitable for the Spring and Summer 8 o'clock Monday night, then started again on Tuesday morning, and worked till 12 o'clock at night, and did this for two or three months without stopping. The foreman stated that the thermometer in the rooms often stood at 130 degrees, worked sixteen, seventeen, and eighteen hours per day.
