RATES OF POSTAGE. The law which went into operation on the first of June, requires payment in money until the necessary stamps and stamped envelopes can be procured, at the rate of five cents per letter, weighing not more than half an ounce, for any distance not exceeding five hundred miles, and five cents additional for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce over five hundred miles.
