THE CONFEDERATE TAX-BILL. The following is a summary of the Tax-Bill Jefferson Davis of Mississippi, President. which was passed by the Confederate Congress on

the 20th of April, 1863:

It imposes a tax of eight per cent. upon the value of all naval stores, salt, wines and spirituous liquors, tobacco manufactured or unmanufactured. cotton, wool, flour, sugar, molasses, syrup, rice, and other agricultural products, held or owned on the first day of July next, and not necessary for family consumption for the unexpired portion of the year 1863, and of the growth or production of any year in a former advertisement. deem it necessary to make the following notice : The articles taxable under the tax in kind law are Wheat, Corn, Oats, Rye, Buckwheat, Irish and Sweet Potatoes, Beans, Peas, Rice, Sugar, cured Hay and N. C. by F. SCARR. Fodder, Molasses made of cane (not of sorghum), Wool, Ground Peas, Cotton, Tobacco and Bacon.

Farmers are allowed to reserve 50 bushels sweet potatoes, 50 bushels Irish potatoes, 59 bushels wheat or 100 bushels corn (but not both), and 20 bushels beans and peas together. After taking out the above named reserve, farmers will be required to deliver to my Agents the tenth of all that remains of their this year's productions. Should anything have been consumed before delivering the tenth, farmers will estimate the amount as nearly as possible and deliver accordingly.

Corn will not be received until it is in good marketable condition, dry-and of course must be shelled by the farmer.

We do not receive Pork for the very good reason that we cannot take care of it; but we require Bacon, and only six lbs. for every hundred lbs. of Pork slau ghtered.





Payment of State Bounty due Deceased Soldiers.

Executive Department, North Carolina, Adjutant Generals Office, Raleigh, Oct. 17, 1862] General Orders, No. 9.]

The following regulations are published for the information of those persons wishing to draw bounty of deceased soldiers, in accordance with an ordinance of the Convention ratified the 22d day of February, 1862:

REGULATIONS.

1. The payment of bounty to the representatives of deceased soldiers is based upon the certificate of the commanding officer of the company, who will state the time of the enlistment of the soldier, the date of his decease in service, the amount of bounty already paid by the State, and the company and regiment to which he belonged.

2. The claimant will make affidavit before a magiztrate that he or she is the next of kin to the deceased, according to the provisions of the foregoing ordinance of the Convention, and that there is no other person entitled to make claim. The affidavit of the claimant must be sustained by that of one disinterested withess, that the facts stated are correct within his own knowledge, and that he has no interest in the claim. The magistrate administering the oath will certify to the credibility of the witness, and the clerk of the County Court will certify, under seal, that he is an authorized and acting magistrate.

3. If the claimant or claimants be minors, payment will be made to the guardian, upon the production of the proper certificate under the seal of the Court, of his appointment and the sufficiency of his bond-the claim to be proved by him as in other cases.

4. A bounty of fifty dollars, deducting the hounty that may have been previously paid, is due to all persons who may have volunteered for three years or the
