In obedience to General Orders No 3, Bureau o Conscription, and General Orders No. 1, from Col. P. Mallett, Commandant of Conscripts for North Carolina Colonels of Militia will, on the 16th February, \$864, enroil all persons liable to conscription under the recent act of Congress of the Confederate States.

The Medical Examining Board and District Enrolling Officer will allow four days for the examination of each Militia Regiment, and but one-fourth of the companies in each regiment will be ordered on the first day of enrollment for said regiment, and one-fourth for each succeeding day, so that invalids and laborers may not be unnecessarily detained, and the Enrolling Officer and Medical Board have due time to do their duty deliberately and thoroughly. THE CONFEDERATE TAX-BILL.

The following is a summary of the Tax-Bill which was passed by the Confederate Congress on the 20th of April, 1863:

It imposes a tax of eight per cents upon the value of all naval stores, salt, wines and spirituous liquors, tobacco manufactured or unmanufactured. cotton, wool, flour, sugar, molasses, syrup, rice, and other agricultural products, held or owned on the 1863, and of the growth or production of any year preceding the year 1863; and a tax of one per cent. upon all moneys, bank notes or other currency, on hand or on deposit on the 1st of July next; and on the value of all credits on which the interest has not been paid and not employed in a business the income derived from which is taxed under the provisions of this act; provided, that all moneys owned, held or deposited beyond the limits of the Confederate States shall be valued at the current rate of exchange in Confederate Treasury notes. The tax to be assessed on the 1st day of July, and collected on the 1st day of October next, or as soon thereafter as may be possible.

Section 5th imposes the following taxes for the year ending the 31st of December, 1863, and for

Bankers shall pay \$500. Auctioneers, retail de alers, tobacconists, pedlars, cattle brokers, apothecaries, photographers, and confectioners; \$50, and 24 per centum on the gross amount of sales made. Wholesale dealers in liquors \$200, and 5 per

centum on gross amount of sales. Retail dealers in liquors, \$100, and 10 per centum on gross amount of sales. Whose sale dealers in groceries, goods. wares, merchandize, etc., \$200, and 24 per centum. Pawn brokers, money and exchange brokers \$200.

\$100, and 24 per centum. Hotels, inns, taverns and eating-houses-first class, \$500; second class, \$300; third class, \$200; fourth class, \$100; fifth class, \$30; Every house where food or refreshments are sold, and every boarding-house where there shall be six boarders or more, shall be deemed to be an eating-house under this act.

Commercial brokers or commission merchants \$200 and 21 per centum. Theatres. \$500 and 5 per centum on all receipts. Each circus, \$100, and \$10 for each exhibition. Jugglers and other persons exhibiting shows, \$50.

Rowling alleys and billiard rooms, \$40 for each alley or table registered. Livery stable keepers. lawyers, physicians, surgeons and dentists, \$50. Butchers and bakers, \$50 and one per centum. All persons engaged, or intending to engage, in any business named in the 5th section, shall, within sixty days after the passage of the act, or at the time of beginning business, and on the 1st of January in each year thereafter, register with thetdis-

Any person failing to make such registry and pay such fax shall, in addition to all other taxes upon his business imposed by the act, pay double the amount of the specific tax on such business, and a like sum for every thirty days of such failure. Requires a separate registry and tax for each business mentioned in the 5th section, and for each place of conducting the same; but no tax for mere storage of goods at a place other than the registered place of business. A new registry required upon every-change in the place of conducting a registered business, upon the death of any person con-

ducting the same, or upon the transfer of the business to another, but no additional tax. Every person registered and taxed is required to make returns of the gross amount of sales from the

passage of the act to the 30th of June, and every three months thereafter. A tax upon all salaries, except of persons in the military or naval service, of I per cent When not exceeding \$1.500, and two per cent upon an excess over that amount. Provided, that no taxes shall be imposed on the salary of any person receiving a salary not exceeding \$1.000 per annum, or at a like rate for another period of time, longer or shorter. The tax on annual incomes, between \$500 and \$1.500, shall be five per cent; between \$1.500 and \$3,000. five per cent on the first \$1,500 and ten per cent on the excess between \$3,000 and \$5,000. ten per cent; between \$5,000 and 10,000, 12d per cent; over \$10.000 fifteen per cent.; subject to the following deductions: on incomes derived from rents of real estate, manufacturing and mining establishments, &c., a sum sufficient for necessary annual repairs; on incomes from any mining or manufacturing business the rent (if rented) cost of labor actually bired, and raw material; on incomes from pavigating enterprises, the hire of the vessels or allowance for wear and tear of the same, not exceeding ten per cent.; on income derived from the sale of merchandize or any other property, the prime cost, cost of transportation, salaries of clerks and rent of building; on incomes from any other occupation, the salaries of clerks, rent, cost of labor. material, &c.; and in case of mutual insurance companies the amount of loss paid by them during the year. Incomes derived from other sources are sub-

ject to no deduction whatever. All joint stock companies and corporations shall pay one-tenth of the dividend and reserved fund annually. If the annual earnings shall give a profit of more than ten and less than twenty per cent on capital stock, one-eighth to be paid; if more than twenty per cent, one-sixth. The tax to be collected on the 1st of January next and of

each year thereafter. A tax of ten per cent. on all profits in 1862 by the purchase and sale of flour, corn, bacon, pork, oats, hay, rice, salt, iron or the manufactures of iron, sugar, molasses made of cane, butter, woolen cloths, shoes, boots, blankets and cotton cloths .-

This is not to apply to regular retail business. Each farmer after reserving for his own use fifty bushels sweet and fifty bushels Irish potatoes, one hundred bushels corn, or fifty bushels wheat, prodoced this year, shall pay and deliver to the Confederate Government one-tenth of the grain, potatoes, forage, sugar, molasses, cotton, wool and

tobacco produced. After reserving twenty bushels peas or beans he shall deliver one tenth thereof. Every farmer, planter, or grazier, one-tenth of the hogs slaughtered by him, in cured bacon, at the rate of 60 pounds of bacon to 100 pounds of pork: REPAIRING. one per cent upon the value of all neat cattle. horses, mules not used in cultivation, and asses, to be paid by the owners of the same, beeves sold to Clock daking business in Charlotte, in the Parks be taxed as income?

That no person liable to military service shall hereafter be permitted or allowed to furnish a substitute for such service, nor shall any substitute be received, culisted or enrolled in the military service of the Confederate States." [Approved December 28th,

An Act to put un end to the Exemption from Military Service, of those who have heretofore furnished Sub-

stitutes. "Whereas, in the present circumstances of the country, it requires the aid of all who are able to bear arms: "The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact. That no person shall be exempted from military service, by reason of his having furnished a substitute; but this act shall not be so construed as to affect persons who, though not liable to render military service, have, nevertheless, furnished substitutes " Approved January 5th, 1864.] .

II. Persons rendered liable to military service by operation of the preceding acts; are placed on the same Distillers. \$200 and 20 per centum. Brewers, footing with all others hitherto liable by Acts of Con-

> III. Persons herein rendered liable to military service are required to report as volunteers or conscripts, without delay, to the enrolling officers; and all who delay beyond the. 1st day of February, 1864, will be considered as having renounced the privilege of volunteering, and held for assignment according to law.

IV. Enrolling officers will proceed, as rapidly as practicable, in the enrollment of persons herein made liable to military service. Previous to enrollment as conscripts, all such persons will be allowed to volunteer in companies in service on the 16th April 1862; Provided, the company chosen does not at the time of volunteering reach the maximum number allowed; and upon such company being selected, the volunteer will receive from the enrolling officer a certificate to the effect that he has so volunteered; and no volunteer will be received into any company except on such certificate. Persons who fail to make their selection, at the time of chrollment, will be a signed according to

existing regulations. V. Persons who report to the enrolling officers will be enrolled and may be allowed a furlough of ten days before reporting to the camp of instruction.

VI. Ail persons whether volunteers or conscripts under this order, will pass through the camp of instruction of the State to which they belong, and be forwarded thence to the companies which are selected, or to which they may be assigned.

VII. The Bureau of Conscription is charged with adopting proper regulations for the enforcement of this VIII. All exemptions heretofore granted are subject to a revision, under instructions from the Bureau of

It resembles the Spanish Fly, but is smaller-is usually found on sweet potato vines about the end of July or beginning of Augus -is collected in the morning and evening by shaking the insects from the plants into hot water. The claimant will make affidavit before a magistrate that he or she is the next of kin to the deceased,

4. A bounty of fifty dollars, deducting the bounty that may have been previously paid, is due to all persons who may have volunteered for three years or the war, and to all persons mustered into or continuend in service under the provisions of the Conscription Act: By order of Governor Vance,
