AN ACT REGULATING THE DEPRECIATION OF CONFEDERATE CURRENCY .- The following explanatory act recently passed by the Legisla- Mr Hardie, of Raleigh requests us to give pubture, will settle the doubts in regard to the meaning of the act "to establish a scale of depreciation of Confederate currency:"

An Act to construe "An Act to establish a ped Scale of Depreciation of Confederate Currency," ratified the 12th day of March, 1866. WHEREAS, Doubts having arisen whether the scale of depreciation therein provided, applies to debts therein named at the date the contracts were made, or at the date the debts become due.

Therefore, to prevent all further doubts, and to prevent all further trouble.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is herebyenacted by the authority of the same, That the scale of depreciation of Confederate currency, established by the above entitled act, shall be construed to apply to debts therein mentioned at the date of contracting the same, and not at the time the said debts become due.

LIME AS A FERTILIZER

PALERMO, ROWAN CO., N. C., Jan. 18. It is a well known fact that compost heaps, by the time they have properly fermented or rotted, are reduced to one-half their original bulk. This has usually taken place at the end of some 10 or 12 weeks and is owing to the escape of the gasses and water, which may be often seen and smelt, during the process of de-

composition. These gases are the most valuable fertilizers, and should by all means be fixed and retained in the heap. Among others that escape, I will enumerate carbonic acid and the salts of ammonia. The following table will show the organic elements contained in 1,000 pounds each, of the agricultural and other products enumerated, and serve to illustrate the importance of paying the greatest attention to

THE CASE OF Rev. GEORGE T. WILLIAMS, IN NEW YORK .- The proptracted examination in the case of the Rev. George T. Williams, of Virginia, who is charged with having picked the pocket of a lady while riding in a Fifth avenue omnibus, New York, in November last, was brought to a close on Saturday by the decision of Justice Dodge, who coucluded to commit the prisoper for trial. Mr Williams has always heretofore maintained an unblemished character in Virginia as an Episcopal clergyman, and the charge against him has excited no little interest in the religious community, which believed he was the victim of professional pickpockets .--

I consider the following facts as having been established: That on the second day of November last, the complainant entered a Fifth avenue stage and seated herself at the extreme end of the left hand side; that the only persons on the same side were two ladies; one at the end by next person who entered that stage was the prisoner, Geo.
