BREEDING.

Many of our farmers seem to conside that it is sufficient for them to purchase a good stock, and that the system of scientific breeding is much too complicated for them. We assure them that they may continue the plan of importation until all their means are exhausted—their stock will continue to degenerate unless they learn to sustain and improve it by judicious crossing. To assist them in effecting this object we quoto the following remarks from a work of Mr. Cline's who was one of the most eglebrated anatomists and authors England ever produced:
