"No doubt something might be hoped for from the Central Rail-Road, if our people will go to work on it in carnest—Resolve to do it, and half the work is done-but if we stand still, and expect others to do it for us, North-Carolina is past hope. It is practicable, or else North-Carolina can never by materially improved. The latter, her true, devoted children cannot admit, without much difficulty, and after bold exertions to dis-prove it. I hope the survey that is order-ed by the State, will stimulate to new ef-torts. I think it would be well for each County near to and through which the Rail-Road is to pass, to subscribe for stock in the name of the County, and obtain a legislative provision at next Assembly to lay a tax to pay for it—it will then be free of any prejudice—the County will be benefitted three ways—the funds will be secured for the County—expended in the County, and the value of property increased by the ex-penditure 100 fold.
