NEW FOOD FOR HOGS. We bespeak the gravity of our readers on reading the following; they must not lough at us for our easy credulity, nor reject the proposition on account of its seeming improbability. For ourselves, we have no doubt of the facts stated, nor of the soundness of the principles upon which the experiments were based. But to the subject.

A few weeks since, two of the members of the United Society of Shakers, at Lebanon, N. Y. were at our office. They informed us, that they had tried an experiment in feeding hogs with the saw dust produced in their button and other wooden ware factory, by mixing it with the assumption of one-third; that is two parts of the usual food, and one part of the saw dust; and that the hogs throve fully as well as when fed in the usual way.—

It seems no way improbable that wood should contain a large quantity of mitritive matter. When decomposed by fire the proportion of insoluble matter is very small, not greater than that of any kind, of farinacious fruit or grain after the water has been evaporated. There is a large quantity of saccharine mattar in most wood, or at least in the juices, and we think it no way improbable that both gluten and farinacious matter, as well as sugar, may by chemists woody fibre-and that these parts of wood when pulverised, may be digested and become nutritious matter in the stomachs of animals. We are not sure that we recollect perfectly the kind of wood used by the Shakers in their experiment, soft maple, Acer rubrum. They have promised us a detailed account of the result of their experiments as soon as they shall

Diving for lost Treasure .- There is a small cutter now lying in our (Yarmouth) roadstead, belonging to a man named Bell. Her crew consists of six men, several of whom are expert in diving. She sails about from place to place to offer assistance to recover lost treasure, &c. She has arrived for the purpose—by permission of the admiralty—of endeavoring to obtain a portion of the treasure lost in the Guernsey Lily transport, which got on the Cross Sand, floated off, and afterwards foundered in the centre of Yarmouth Roads, in 43 feet water, coming with stores, &c. from Holland, after the Duke of York's expedition in 1799. The transport was laden with horses, ammunition-in which there were 25 brass field pieces—a stock of wine, &c. The method these divers use is curi-The cutter is placed immediately over the wreck; the diver then, habited in an India-rubber air-tight dress, having a tube attached at the back of the neck to receive the air-which is constantly kept pumping in-descends from a rope ladder, and gives signals for certain things to be sent down by a small line, which is attended to by those on the deck of the cutter; by this line baskets and other utensils are sent down for the use of the diver, and sent up again with wine, &c. taken from the wreck. diver's head-dress is curious; it is composed of copper, and is a complete covering, made much after the manner of the ancient helmet, only that it is made larger than the head, and has in its upper part three glass windows; it weighs fifty pounds. He has two dresses on besides that above men-tioned. He carries down with him one hundred and twenty pounds of lead in two bags. With all this weight, he declares that when in the water he appears per-fectly free from weight or incumbrance of any sort. There has been already brought up a large quantity of wine, the bottles curiously tattooed with large and small oysters, which have been tasted, and are excellent, some copper, iron handles of chests, pieces of gun-carriages, &c. They hope soon to be in possession of the brass guns, valuable plate, and the dollars, which it was known the transport had on board for the purpose of paying the troops employed in the above mentioned expedition. The Admiralty, we understand, has handsomely given permission to Capt. Bell to make what use he pleases of the articles found, only conditioning that the brass guns, if recovered, shall be given up, for which they will return their value. Great numbers of persons from different parts of the country have been off to view this novel and singular undertaking. Boatmen are in constant attendance to take off, at moderate charge, those persons who wish to witness this effort of human ingenuity and enterprise. The diver, when under water, find his strength so increased, that he can bend the ends together, of the large iron crowbar-of 31 feet long, and 21 inch in sizewhich he takes down with him to part the wreck. The divers go down alternately about twice a day, but are compelled to take advantage of the tide, when it is slack water. The first descent was on Saturday, and has been repeated every day since, which has proved a great treat to numbers of all ranks who have attended to observe this surprising, perhaps unequalled exhibition.—Norwich (Eng.)
