He has left his indelible impress upon the age in which he lived-victory seemed alike to perch upon his standard, whether engaged in the political contests of his country, or in fighted by this nation, which he has konoured by his talents and made glorious by his military achievements.

The contest of the Revolution embraced more than England and her colonics. It was a contest between liberty and despotsm. It embraced the whole human family: had the latter prevailed, the gloom of despotism would have covered the face Nor was this the only enemy with which our of the whole earth, and ignorance, superstation and patriotic sires had to contend, for bleagued oppres- slavery would have been the inevitable and depior-
