FATAL STORM .- The storm of last Thursday was very destructive in a portion of Gaston. In the angle between South Fork and Catawba, it was especially severe. Mrs. Adam Hoffman returning home ran into a negro but to escape the storm, the house was upset killing her and injuring a negro woman severely. The fences were swept entirely away in that neighborhood and quite a number of houses were destroyed. All Tommy McLean place. All the fences on large tree. the northern part of Wm. R. McLean's plantation were blown down. Dr. John McLean had a horse killed by a falling tree; a negro riding the horse was not injured. Young John McLean was knocked off his horse but not seriously hurt. The storm crossed the Catawba between Neal's Mills and Rock Island and expended its fury in the black-jack country about Daniel Gallant's. It destroyed all his out buildings and unroofed his house. The same thing happened on the place of Mr. Samuel W. Crowell. All the houses except the dwelling house were destroyed on Mr. Robert Ross' place. The houses and fences were considerably injured on the places of Mr. John B. Grier and others in that neighorhood. We learn that S. Watson Reid was also a considerable sufferer by the
