FUGITIVE SLAVE BILL IN CALIFORNIA.

In the California Legislature recently, Mr. Crabb introduced a bill, entitled "An act respecting fugitives from labor and slaves brought to this State prior to re-admission into the Union."

"Any person or persons held to labor or service in any State or Territory of the U. States, by the laws of such State or Territory, and who were brought or introduced within the limits of this State previous to the admission of this State as one of the United States of America, and who shall refuse to return to the State or Territory where he or they owed such labor or service, his or their agent or attorney, to whom such service or labor was due, such person or persons so refusing to return shall be held and deemed fugitives from labor within the meaning of this act; and all the remedies, rights, and provisions herein given to claimants of fugitives from labor within the meaning of this section."

Mr. Ellis, of Nevada, contended that the effect of this section would be to establish a state of slavery in California for an unlimited series of years; that it would hold persons to labor who are not "fugitives" within the meaning of the act.
