

...and their crushing masses of metal upon the enemy with overwhelming energy. The mortars and howitzers vomited forth their deadly missiles with desolating fury. An iron maelstrom covered sea and land. Its ravages were pitiless, its force grasp unrelenting. Night brightened the scene. The darkness was illuminated by blazing shells falling the air. The sea glowed with the broadsides of the ships. Fired with extraordinary skill, the bombs converged upon the besieged town with a horrid accuracy. The heavy fall of the descending shot and shells was heard above our lines. The domes of the churches reverberated beneath explosions that shook the ground, and lighted up the heavens with a fierce glare. The full power of modern military skill, and the destructive art of war, were exhibited in all their potency, without intermission, during three days and nights. On the 25th, an application for a truce was made by the enemy, which was refused, and a surrender demanded. Accordingly, on the following morning, the city and fortress fell into our hands. The stars and stripes floated in triumph, for the first time on the battlements of the castle of San Juan de Ulloa, and waved their victorious folds over the walls of Vera Cruz. Among the fruits of this victory were 3,000 prisoners, and 500 pieces of artillery. Our loss was but six killed, and sixty wounded.
