
In the spring of 1839 Mr. Webster visited England, Scotland and France. In England especially he was received with cordiality, and treated with respect and honor, to an extent probably never before manifested to a private, unofficial visiter. In 1840 he gave himself up for months to the promotion of Gan. Harrison's election. When General Harrison succeeded to the Presidency, he promptly sought counsel from Mr. Webster, offering him any post in the Cabinet he might choose, and asking his advice as to whom he should select for the other members. Mr. Webster became Secretary of State, and set himself earnestly to the adjustment of the pending disputes.


