The Kotza Affair.

Gen. James Tallmadge, who died suddenly in New York on Thursday, was over 75 years of age. He had been successively a member of Congress and of the New York Legislature, and Lieutenant Governor of the State; also, a member of the two State Conventions which framed the constitutions of 1821 and 1846; and, since his residence in New York City, and his being president of the New York University and of the American Institute.

The Secretary of the Interior, on a recent appeal from a decision of Mr. Wallis, Commissioner of Pensions, (which he has confirmed) has decided, that if a minor child, filing a claim under the bounty land act of September, 1850, becomes an adult while the claim is pending before the Pension Office, or at any time before the issuing of the warrant, the claim lapses, or becomes extinct. And that this decision applies to a case in which the proof was completed during the minority of the applicant, but he or she arrived at full age while the claim was awaiting its turn to come up for examination.

The names of the two wings of the democratic party in New York have been changed. "The Salts," it is said, desire to be known as the "Untried Democracy" - a name in which they were recognized by John Van Buren, on Wednesday last, at Syracuse, in denunciation of the "Bunkers," who, not desiring to have the name of the party changed, thought it the wisest course to keep out of their way. The "Bunkers," in consequence of having become frightened, are to be hereafter called the "Territorial Democrats." They are a pretty set of Democrats.

The aspect of the Turkish difficulty is now threatening than ever. The Turks are roused to the highest pitch of fanaticism, and so far as to call upon the Sultan to declare war against Russia or to abdicate the throne. In the meantime the Great Powers are endeavoring to induce the Sultan to accept the original Vienna note, but dispatches from Vienna dated the 20th ult., contain a report that was prevalent that Austria had looked out from her alliance with France and England to side with Russia in the decline to sanction the grant of the collective note against any further interference of the party of Russia in the Porte and its subjects. Another dispatch from Vienna says that instructions had been sent to the English and French ministers at Constantinople to urge the Porte to accept the first note. In Constantinople, however, the plan continues to be postponed on the wall, and a letter, bearing against England has been engendered among the Mussulmans, so much so that negotiators of that country have been freely circulated.

It seems to be the general feeling at Constantinople that the Sultan would make no further concessions either to Russia or to the Powers. It was also rumored that the dispute between the English and French Ambassadors had been revived. The French Minister insisting that the boats should come up to Constantinople, and the English Minister objecting thereto. The Bey of Tunis had informed the Porte that his forces were ready to take the field. The Spanish Ministry had resigned. The elders were ravaging the cities and towns of England and Ireland.

MR. WALKER. The New York Journal of Commerce explains the causes of Mr. Walker's relinquishment of the China Mission. The explanations are certainly not very creditable to the Government. The Journal says: "He accepted upon three express conditions, namely: that he should have carte blanche to make such a commercial treaty as he might find when upon the spot to be the most proper and advantageous, or, in other words, that he would be tied down by no specific instructions; and that he should be sent out in a national ship; and that he should be sent out immediately. The administration accepted the conditions, and promised to dispatch Mr. Walker in a national ship; and to do it immediately; but, owing to the defects of our naval establishment, they could not perform what they had promised. Mr. Walker was quite determined not to go to China under a foreign flag, and not to trust himself to the Allegheny. He would have preferred, probably, to risk himself in the little revenue cutter which bears his name. The Government cannot send Mr. Walker to China, and neither is he now much inclined to go. He has various, and to him more important and interesting matters to employ him at home."

DEATH OF THE REV. DR. WITHERSPOON. It can be seen by an obituary in today's paper, that this eminent Minister of the Gospel died at his residence near this place on Sunday last. Connected, as he had been, with the Presbyterian Church here from 1820 to 1852 as its Pastor; having been, as it were, the first to plant the standard of the cross in this community; he had a strong hold upon the esteem and affections of our citizens. His funeral took place on Monday, and in respect to his memory the business houses were closed during the solemnities, and nearly all the citizens in the village attended the services. In the eulogistic tribute to the memory of the deceased, as part of the funeral sermon it was very appropriately suggested that a monument should be erected by the members of the Presbyterian church and other citizens of the town, to the memory of Dr. Witherspoon, as he had done more, perhaps, than any other man for the morals of the place. We hope the suggestion will be carried into effect. - Hillsboro Recorder.
