During the last fiscal year the receipts from customs were, for the first time, more than \$64,000,000, and from all sources, \$73,918,141...

On the 4th of March, 1853, the amount of the public debt was \$68,129,937. There was a subsequent increase of \$2,750,000 for the debt of Texas...

On examining the expenditures of the last five years, it will be seen that the average deducting payments on account of the public debt has been about \$45,000,000...

The amount of reduction, as well as the manner of effecting it, are questions of great and general interest; it being essential to industrial enterprise and the public prosperity...

The restoration of comparative tranquillity in that Territory furnishes the means of serving duty, and appreciating at their just value the events which have occurred there...

We perceive that countries concerning the future domestic industry was inevitable; that no human prudence, no form of legislation, no wisdom on the part of Congress, could have prevented this.

It is idle to suppose that the particular provisions of their organic law were the cause of agitation. These provisions were but the occasion, or the pretext of an agitation, which was inherent in the nature of things.

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The assumption that, because in the organization of the Territories of Nebraska and Kansas, Congress abstained from imposing restraints upon them to which certain other Territories had been subject...

In those parts of the U. S. where, by reason of the inflated State of the public mind, false rumors and misrepresentations have the greatest currency, it has been assumed that it was the duty of the Executive not only to suppress inflammatory movements...

The condition of the navy is not merely satisfactory, but exhibits the most gratifying evidence of increased vigor. As it is comparatively small, it is more important that it should be as complete as possible in all the elements of strength...

The execution of the law of February 25, 1853, to promote the efficiency of the navy, has been attended by the most advantageous results. The law of promoting advancement among the men is found commendable and salutary.

It is a decided and gratifying indication of progress creditable to it and to the country. The suggestion of the Secretary of the Navy is regarded as further improvement in that branch of the service, if commensurate to your favorable opinion.
