

LATE FROM EUROPE.
ARRIVAL OF STEAMER NORTH AMERICA.

QUEBEC, May 17.

The steamer North America arrived here this morning, bringing advices from Liverpool to the 2d inst.

The sales of cotton for the three days amounted to \$4,000 bales. Prices have advanced 2d., and the market closed buoyant. Manchester advices favorable. Broadstairs and previous steady. Consuls 97.

NOTES BY THE NORTH AMERICAN.

The resolutions for the future government of India are progressing in the English Parliament. Resolutions endorsing the union of the Danubian Principalities have been passed.

The Budget has been adopted by a large majority in the House of Commons of the French Legislature.

The envoys of the leading powers have requested a German Diet to consider the propositions of Denmark relative to the Dithmarschen.

A collision had occurred in St. George's Channel between a steamer and a barque. Both were sunk, and thirty persons were drowned.

In France, the grain crops were promising. Broadstairs were firmer.

Advices from India state that Nana Sahib had been reinforced, and was about to commence offensive operations.

Broadstairs were generally steady. Flour was dull. Wheat was quiet. Corn was quiet and slightly advanced. Barley was dull at 44. 3d. per cwt. Spirits of turpentine was steady at 44s. Rice was quiet.

London date of Wednesday says that the Bank had incurred. The Exchequer statement was satisfactory. Discount rates were ranging from 2d. to 2½ per cent. Consols were quoted at 97 to 97½.

LATER FROM EUROPE.
ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER NIAGARA.

HALIFAX, May 19.

The steamer Niagara arrived at this port this morning, bringing advices from Liverpool to the 2d instant.

The sales of cotton for the week amounted to \$1,000 bales. All qualities have advanced 1d. further. Consuls 97 to 97½.

Nothing later from India has been received.

FURTHERS FROM THE NETHERLANDS.

The London Times speak approvingly of the extension of the United States authority to Central America.

Sir Colin Campbell demands large reinforcements to India immediately.

Oriental Fair was opened at the Orleans meeting at 3 45p. Monday fair at 3 45p. Market midday at 7 3 10d. upland 10s. 1d. and spiced midday 7d. per lb.—The market closed buoyant. On Saturday afternoon, the 1st instant, the sales were 7,000 bales, and the market showed a declining tendency. The stock on hand comprised 210,000 bales, of which 42,000 bales were American cotton.

Broadstairs were generally declining. Four was declining with quotations barely maintained. Wheat was very dull. Corn was firm and advancing. On Saturday afternoon, breadstuffs were generally dull, but corn was still high and advancing. Sugar had improved in the first qualities. Rice was dull at 20s. & 22s. Barley was steady as 4d. a bushel for common, and 4s. a bushel for best. Spirits of turpentine was dull at the 4s.

Dates from Havre are to the 5th inst.—Cotton was slightly stiffer, and all qualities had improved. The sales for the week comprised 19,000 bales, the market closing buoyant. The market was quoted at 10d. Rice was quiet and declining.

THE DEAR ALIVE.—Two years ago I was belonging to a traveling circus full of a wagon and was so badly maimed that he has never since recovered a crippled. The accident affected his mind, and the asylum to which he was consigned—the Alm House at Leiden, about thirty miles from this city—he was known by the cognomen of "Crazy Jack." About a week ago he became seriously ill, and in all appearance, gave up the ghost; but ceased to breathe; the muscles of his face were rigid, his eyes fixed, yet in short the doctor pronounced him a dead individual, and as a matter of course the authority of the doctor is decided upon that point. Accordingly he was decently arrayed in his grave clothes, and stretched upon what we believe to be a coffin board, where he was left all night, preparatory to his being consigned to mother earth the next day. At an early hour in the morning, one of the people attached to the establishment entered the room, and glancing towards the corpse discovered it was lying on its side. Advancing nearer, he was surprised on perceiving that the eyes were wide open, watching him with some attention. His hands shook, and the preparations in hogsheads burst from his head as he gazed upon the apparition, while slowly raising himself to a sitting position, exclaimed, as he turned his visual organ upon his master couch, "I never did see the form you gies in this iteration, but I blessed if this house isn't the hard luck of any I ever had."

THE GOVERNOR OF MAINE CONVICTED OF TURP.—Hon. Lot M. Morrill, the Black Republican Governor of Maine, had, not long recently issued a proclamation calling upon the people of that commonwealth to observe a day of fasting and prayer. Some injuriously curious Democratic editor, in reading this document, was struck with a passage which occurs in a work published by the Rev. H. Chapman, in 1854, and his excommunication convinced him that the Executive had appropriated the literary labors of another in preparing his proclamation for a day of fasting and prayer.

On commencing my Presidential career, I found that the Sabbath had frequently been employed by visitors for private interviews with the President. I determined to put an end to this custom, and ordered my doorman to meet all Sunday visitors with an indeterminate refusal.—While Chairman of the Committee of Ways and Means in Congress, and during my whole Presidential career, my labors were always arduous and often excessive; but I never suffered an hour of sickness through them all.

A WISE RULE.—Among the lessons taught by Bishop Soule to the preachers is the following, which we heard him (says the New Orleans Advocate) utter at the Alabama Conference, as a preventive against all embarrassments growing out of debt. It even defines the limits of safe speculations; and, if observed by business men, would take the edge off of panics: "Brethren, my rule is this, and I advise you to adopt it: Never owe any more than you are able to pay, and allow no man to owe you more than you are able to lose."

REVERSE OF FORTUNE.—A few days ago one of the visitors of the Provident Association, at the West End, was applied to, to assist a man who was found in abject poverty in a miserable garret, without food or decent clothing. Food was provided for him and a change of clothing, by the benevolent visitor. Only a few years ago this same man was a New York merchant, with at least \$100,000, living in a splendid residence, and riding in a princely carriage. We keep back the gentleman's name from motives of delicacy, though it is a familiar one to some of our merchants. How true is it, that "Riches take to themselves wings and fly away."—Boston Traveller.
