GEORGETOWN, S. C.

This once flourishing town is situated at the head of Winyah Bay, on the point of land between Black River and Saupit Creek, about 12 or 15 miles from the Atlantic Ocean.

There are many interesting incidents connected with its Revolutionary history, especially during the time it was occupied by the British soldiers.

Here, too, was seen less than half a dozen black-headed "Whigs" dashed into a town "chock full of red-coats," and frightening them out of their wits, and afterwards escaping without harm from the enraged British, who, when they discovered how few there were of the Whigs, rallied forth from their hiding places to take vengeance on these "mad caps."

To fact, Georgetown was the "Hornet's Nest" of North Carolina.

Georgetown is put down on the school maps, as having 2,000 inhabitants, and doubtless it once had that number, but it is questionable whether it has half that number now. It has been truly said that "Georgetown has got its growth," and not only so, it has passed its meridian, and is fast going to decay. This is obvious to any one who visits the place, and is the first thing that strikes the stranger on entering the town, almost every part of which has an old and dilapidated appearance.

There are a few comparatively new and handsome residences here. Its commerce, too, is on the decline; at least, so thinks your correspondent, and if he should be allowed to express an opinion, it would not be that it would continue to do so; he will not, however, give all his reasons for this opinion. One has reference, however, to the morality of the people, for though there are a number, and a goodly number, too, of very pious persons in the town, yet I hesitate not to say, that Georgetown is the most immoral place I have ever been in: there is more profanity you cannot walk the streets, or go about the wharves, without hearing your ears constantly saluted with oaths. And though you seldom see what the world calls a drunkard man, you will find plenty of red eyes, and flushed faces, to convince you that "Alky" reigns a king. Another will appear from the following significant fact, to wit: Last Monday (Feb. 21st) was appointed, by the proper authorities, as a day on which to hold a Railroad meeting, and open books of subscription to build a road from Georgetown to some point on the North-Eastern Road. Of course a large turn-out and liberal subscriptions were expected. At about half-past 12 o'clock, the meeting was called to order by L. D. Dorrier, Esq., and organized by calling Hon. J. H. Reid to the chair, and appointing R. Dorrier, Esq. Secretary. The President, after thanking the audience (about seventy-five or a hundred in number) for the honor done him in calling him to preside over their deliberations, proceeded to state the object of the meeting to be the improvement of the commerce of the ancient town of Georgetown, referring to the days of her prosperity, and saying that she had since fallen into an "Old North Carolina, Old Rip Van Winkle sleep," and expressing the hope that she would arouse herself and again become prosperous. Mr. Solomon, the Superintendent of the N. E. Road, was then introduced, and made a statement of the estimated cost of the proposed Road, about \$345,000, and expressed the opinion, that by a subscription, by individuals, of \$200,000, the road could be built. And now comes the significant fact, that after the business of the meeting was gone through, the book was brought forward and subscriptions solicited, when one thousand dollars (\$1000) was subscribed on the spot. **SHAKE YOURSELF AGAIN! THE PARAGUAY EXPEDITION.

A letter from a correspondent of the Tribune, on board the St. Lawrence, at Montevideo, and dated December 23, says: "The store-ship Release has just arrived on the station and the sleep of war. Public ween carried near hand a few days ago. If the cargo for the big gun on board the Fulton comes out in the steamer Southern Star, as expected it will, the former will, so pre-arranged, be the bearer of Shubrick's flag, and, indeed, I am disposed to believe that, whether the gun was used or not, the Fulton will be the pioneer up the river. This ship will be home about the latter part of March or the first week of April. We have been out here two years, during which time we never performed a service that could point a moral or add a tale. The Falknouth will be relieved by the Proteus, immediately on the conclusion of hostilities or terms of peace. The big Perry and Bainbridge will also be ordered home, when their services are no longer required, but it is believed that the steamer Water Witch and Fulton will have to do some service here. There are ten English, six French and ten Spanish men-of-war on the Brazils station."

PARAGUAY IN A COMPLETE STATE OF DEFENSE.

A letter from Buenos Ayres, referring to the difficulty between the United States and Paraguay, says: "The Paraguays had so strongly fortified the river that it was not expected the Americans would succeed in any resolute attempt they might make. It was said that a number of English officers were assisting the Paraguays. The latter had also thrown every obstacle in the way of the United States Squadron ascending the river. Many of the American ships-of-war, from their draught of water, would be unable to proceed up the river. The American Squadron consisted of fifteen ships and gun-boats."

BROADSHEET EXPLOSION.

NEW ORLEANS, March 1.—The steamboat Princess, from Vicksburg for the steamboard, when near Baton Rouge, on Sunday morning, exploded a boiler and burst to the water's edge. Four hundred persons were on board, 210 of whom are supposed to be killed or drowned. Those missing are mostly residents of Louisiana and Mississippi. A large number of ladies are among the missing. Among the killed is Mr. Samuel Watts of Va. A large number are badly scalded and otherwise injured. No other names of persons from the North have been obtained.

A PRESIDENTIAL VETO.

The message of the President of the United States on Saturday last, returning to the House of Representatives, (the body in which it originated,) with his objections, the bill "donating public lands to the several States and Territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts," was by no means an unexpected event.

CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. In the Senate, to-day, Mr. Sibley said, as the defective rate of the Senate, permitted the minority to prevent a vote, he would, rather than sacrifice the appropriation bill, and thereby render it necessary for a call of an extra session of Congress, and particularly as the Senate has already expressed an opinion in favor of the acquisition of Cuba by a vote of twelve majority, last night—he said he would withdraw the bill and bring it forward the next session of Congress.

The army appropriation bill was passed, with an amendment of nearly one million dollars for fortifications.

The House passed the post office appropriation bill in the same form as reported on yesterday.

There was an unsuccessful effort made to take up the tariff bill.

Various amendments to the appropriation bill were acted on; and the naval appropriation bill was debated.

In the Senate, to-day, a Committee of Conference was appointed in relation to the Executive Appropriation Bills. The Post Office Appropriation Bill was discussed.—The House was engaged in the consideration of the Naval Appropriations Bill.

March 1. The Senate has been engaged in the discussion of the Miscellaneous Appropriation bill, but has the Post Office bill. The House has passed struck out the clause appropriation \$200,000 for the new Custom House at Charleston. The Ocean Mail bill has been taken up.

March 2. The Senate, last night, passed the Naval Appropriations Bill, and to-day were engaged in the discussion of miscellaneous appropriation bills until their recess.

March 1. The House has returned Commodore Stewart to the active list, as the senior officer of the Navy, and has disposed of the amendments originating in the Senate to the army bill. They have refused to repeal the restrictive clause in the English Kansas bill, and have reconsidered and again stricken out the Ocean bill.

Both Houses of Congress are still in session on the Appropriation bills.

ADJOURNMENT OF CONGRESS, &c.

WASHINGTON, March 4. Owing to points pending between the House and Senate, regarding the raising the revenue and increasing the postage, all the appropriation bills for the land and ocean mail service for the coming year have been laid over. Every other appropriation bill was passed. The Treasury bill and the bill abolishing the franking privilege were also passed. The bill for increasing the rates for postage was debated.

There is no probability of an extra session. Congress adjourns at noon.

LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF STEAMER CITY OF BALTIMORE.

NEW YORK, March 1. The steamer City of Baltimore has arrived at this port, bringing advices from Liverpool to the 16th ult.

The sale of cotton for the three days amounted to 33,900 bales, of which speculators took 7,000 and exporters 2,000. Prices advanced 1.10 to 1.15. The market opened firm, but fell off at the close, and quotations hardly maintained under the Europa's news.

The sales on Tuesday were 5,900 bales. Middling Orleans was quoted at 7 1/4, and middling uplands 6 1/4.

Cocoas are quoted at 95 1/2 to 95 1/4.

The war question remains unchanged.

SECOND DISPATCH.

Manchester advices are favorable. All qualities have slightly advanced, and the market active, in consequence of the advices received by the steamer India.

Four dull—market generally unchanged. Wheat very dull—prices easier, but quotations unchanged. Corn steady. Provisions steady. Lard dull, but prices firm, at 65c. Coffee dull, at 45c. Sugar quiet. Rio de Janeiro Coffee dull. Turpentine firm, with sales of 61,000 barrels, at an advance of 6d. in some cases.

MEMPHIS, TENN., March 2.—

Half the houses in a square on Main street including the office of the Eagle and Equator, Avalanche, Ledger, Christian Advocate and Protestant Advocate, were burnt to-day. Among the sufferers are Hutton & Clark, printers, Gillespie & Warren, Saffarans & Stratton, W. H. Hunt, N. Stillman, Heinrich & Bro's (saloon) and Joe. Tenzel. Loss \$350,000, with only a partial insurance.

THE PRESIDENT'S DESIGN.—

The New York Times Washington Correspondent under date of the 14th inst., says: "We are beginning to get a little light upon the Thirty Million bill, and to learn something of the secret springs that are pressing it forward. The development of no distant day will expose it as a grand combination of political and financial parties, one of which several distasteful parties are to pocket windings—some of whom are to be elevated and thus reduced to a proper frame of mind for exposing all the details of the plot. For the present, however, we have some faint glimmerings of light that will serve to indicate the general character of the movement, and the motives of those engaged behind the scenes in pulling the wires."

NEW YORK, March 2. THE STEAMER BLACK WARRIOR.—The steamer Black Warrior has entirely gone to pieces. Her machinery will probably be saved. The steamer Marion is still ashore.

HORRIBLE TRAGEDY IN WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27, 6 P. M.—Our entire community was thrown into a state of the most intense excitement to-day in consequence of the fatal shooting of the Hon. Philip Barton Key, United States Attorney for the District of Columbia, by the Hon. Daniel E. Sickles, member of Congress from the City of New York.

According to the most current report, it seems that Mr. Sickles having become convinced of the truth of various scandalous rumors concerning the inhumanity of his wife with Mr. Key, resolved to rid his wrongs. Mrs. Sickles, it is said, having signed an acknowledgment of her guilt.

About two o'clock this afternoon, Mr. Sickles having stationed himself in a favorable position, discovered Mr. Key making signals for Mrs. Sickles, from over Lafayette Square.

The enraged husband no longer doubting the truth of all he had heard, and suffering deeply from the dishonor brought upon his family, immediately left his residence, which is nearly in front of the President's mansion, and soon came up to Mr. Key, who was conversing with Mr. Butterworth, of New York, and saluted the outraged husband in a friendly manner.

Mr. Sickles immediately charged Key with having dishonored him and destroyed his domestic peace—at the same time drawing a revolver and firing rapidly at his victim. One of the balls entered the unfortunate man's left side, passed through the body, and lodged under the skin on the opposite side. Another shot took effect in the right thigh, near the femoral artery. Key then fell to the ground and in piteous tones implored Mr. Sickles not to kill him. But the grievously wronged husband was deaf to all entreaties—he could not bear to pity—and fired the third shot, which took effect in the right side, and glanced from the body.

In a few moments Mr. Key breathed his last. The body was removed to the National Club House, and a jury of inquest immediately summoned. The verdict immediately stated that deceased came to his death from the effects of pistol shots fired by Mr. Daniel E. Sickles.

After the tragedy was enacted, Mr. Sickles went to the residence of Attorney-General Black, in Frank Row, and communicated the affair to that gentleman. Mr. Black advised him to deliver himself into the hands of the officers, which he subsequently did, and was conveyed to jail. An examination will take place to-morrow.

The high position of the parties to this terrible affair has interested it with more importance than would otherwise be the case, and has produced the most unusual excitement in all circles of society.

The city is full of rumors—some stating that an improper intimacy has existed between Mr. Key and Mrs. Sickles for nearly a year. Others say that Mr. Sickles has repeatedly remonstrated with his wife against her injudicious conduct, and requested Mr. Key to discontinue his visits to his residence. But nothing can be relied upon, until a judicial investigation is held. Mr. Key was a Louisianian, and appointed to the office of Attorney General for the District, by President Buchanan. He Agured very prominently at the great Napier Bill, on the night of the 17th.

Mrs. Sickles is possessed of great personal attractions, and up to this unfortunate affair has been held in high esteem by all who knew her. —*Pitt. Express.*

FURTHER FROM HAYTI.—

Souloque's God-den Crown.—A letter from Hayti, after giving an account of the inauguration of Gueffard, the new President of Hayti, says:

The most distinctive mark of the overthrown aristocracy, the golden crown, for whose manufacture the people expended so much labor and blood—that crown, which, in the hand of the nation, ought to serve as a despotic, and become the property of an ignorant man—that crown was laid on the table of the President of the Senate. The people asked themselves what is going to take place, and the sincere friends of liberty and the revolution, the true patriots, those who see the revolution, perfect its work of restoration by forgiveness, magnanimity and persuasion, began to fear, that to the inauguration of the reign of the law, the worthy chief of the nation would not have the idea of destroying what was overthrown. But that fear was speedily dispelled, for Gueffard, rising up, (and all the people also) made a short address to explain how the symbolic despotism of the monarchy in Hayti, instead of being an act of vandalism, of destruction unworthy of the republic, is a moral, delicate and sublime destruction of a regime which was incompatible with the manners, the character and the nationality of the Haytiens, and taking a little iron hammer, he struck three times on the awful emblem of tyranny that he had overthrown.

Souloque, was at last appeased, lying sick at Jamaica, and his advanced age renders his recovery impossible.

THE NEW POST-ROUTE BILL.—

The amendments to the Post Route Bill, which has just passed the Senate, abolishing the franking privilege indiscriminately, is calculated to embarrass the Executive Department of the Government materially. That the privilege has been enlarged and excessively abused is beyond doubt, and a reform is quite needed. The subject, however, has not been fairly met, or received the consideration its importance demanded. No reservation is laid as to the interests of each public quarter returns of excessive weight are made to the Post Office Department and other Departments, which, if taxed with postage, would more than aggregate the amount proposed to be saved by the measure, and would necessarily come out of the Treasury of the United States. Take the returns of the New York Post Office alone; its transmission would cost the Department eleven hundred and fifty dollars; that of Baltimore, Philadelphia, Boston, and indeed all the larger offices, would range from five hundred dollars upwards; to which may be added the second class and minor offices, whose returns may be set down at an average of five dollars each, amounting to thirteen thousand six hundred a quarter, five hundred and forty-four thousand per annum. This amount, without adding the postage according to official correspondence of the Department, may fairly be considered as approximately to the expense of the Post Office Department alone. The State, Treasury, War, and Navy Departments, and their subordinate branches, are in receipt of returns and other heavy mailable matter, which would increase the drafts up on the Treasury to an incredible amount.

OUR RAILROAD.

We are glad to have it in our power to inform our readers that the prospects of the Road are better than they have heretofore been. This has been brought about by various causes. It is true according to the information we have received that the Legislature has not given us any more aid, still all the amendments which we have to our charter, we think should give new confidence to the enterprise. The amendment alluded to, as we understand it is this: That as soon as the first section of twenty-five miles on the Western division is completed, the Treasurer is required to issue the bonds of the State, to the amount of \$300,000, and pay the proceeds to the company, instead of endorsing the bonds of the Company, as was required by the original charter. We have not seen the bill, but above is the substance of what we understand it to be. This should encourage confidence in the enterprise; because the State having heretofore appropriated large amounts of money for internal improvements, we think she is beginning to feel something of a burden of debt, being determined as we think, to ease the blue Ridge and tap the Mississippi river, her present and prospective indebtedness makes her think of economy, hence, we have been informed
