COTTON BURNT.—Yesterday afternoon, between 12 and 1 o'clock, at the cars were being shifted at the Hamburg Depot of the South Carolina Railroad, the cotton on one of the open cars was discovered to be on fire. The fire, it was supposed, was communicated to the cotton by sparks from the locomotive, and the train being in motion, and a strong breeze blowing in the time, almost the entire lot of cotton on the car—being about forty bales—was soon burnt. A small quantity of it will probably be saved, but in a damaged condition.
