PARKER'S VARIETIES?

Later from Europe.
Arrival of the Steamer Africa.

New York, April 27.

The steamship Africa arrived at this port to day, bringing advices from Liverpool to the 14th instant.

The sales of cotton for the four days amounted to 45,000 bales. Prices have slightly declined—the decline is chiefly on the inferior qualities. Holders are pressing their stocks on the market. Some circulars quote the advance at \$1 to \$2, and say the market was very irregular; middling qualities declined most; fair improved most—Breadstuffs advancing. Provisions dull—Consols 94 to 94½ for money.

Still Later from Europe.
Arrival of Steamship Vanderbilt.

The Fight between Henson and Sayers.

Sandy Hook, April 28.

The steamship Vanderbilt, which sailed from Liverpool on the 18th instant, passed this point to day.

The sales of cotton for the three days amounted to 21,000 bales. All qualities have slightly declined—the inferior 1-16 to 14.

The fight between Henson and Sayers took place early on the morning of the 17th, and lasted two hours and eight minutes, when the excitement of crowd broke down the barriers leaving the fight undelivered. Both were dreadfully punished—Over one hundred rounds were fought—Henson is nearly blind. Opinion is divided regarding who is the best man.
