Terrible Accident near Camden!

27 Persons KNOWN to be DROWNED!

CAMDEN, May 5.—10:30 p. m.—A shocking and heart-rending accident occurred at Hinkin's Mill Pond, about nine miles from this place, this afternoon. A party were in a flatboat, near the middle of the pond, fishing when by some accident the boat upset, and twenty-seven persons (a great many ladies) were drowned.

SECOND DESPATCH.

11 p. m.—The following are the names of those known to be lost:

Miss Minnie Alexander, Miss Sarah Howell, Miss Crosby McKagen and three children of Mr. McKagen; Alice Robinson, John Oaks, two young men, Legrands, three children of Samuel Young, Miss Kelly, two young men named Hoscott, and many more in the water.

The pond will be emptied to eight feet they may recover all.

Mr. Billings, who was in the flat, says that twenty-seven are drowned.

A CONFIDENT GENTLEMAN.—The Mobile Tribune relates the following: "An old-fashioned, innocent-looking countryman, some fifty years of age, wearing plain country clothes, and who says he lives in the backwoods and seldom comes to town, called an officer Fuller yesterday morning with a statement something like the following: He had come to the city on a little business, and had about three hundred dollars in bills on some of the city banks, which he wanted to change for gold; but, never having been in a bank, he neither knew where to find it nor how to proceed to get the gold if it were found. Happening to meet a good-looking, well-dressed man, he inquired where the bank was, telling him for what purpose he wanted to find it. The man proposed to go and show him the bank; and as they walked on together he seemed so kind the old man asked him to take the money and change it for him, which he, quite obliging, consented to do, and he took it. When they came in front of the Battle House he told the old man that was the bank, and to wait a minute and he would step in and get the gold for him. The old man waited, and, as he did not return, stepped in at about the end of an hour to look for him, and, not finding him, inquired and learned that he was at the Battle House instead of a bank."

A SPLENDID FRAME.—Morris Earle & Son, Chestnut street, have just made for the President's House, at Washington, a very large and truly superb gilt frame, enclosing more space than the largest six-d-mirror intended to contain the full length portrait of President Buchanan. This is pursuant to the order of Congress, which directed portraits and frames for all the Presidents to be procured. Surmounting the centre of the top is a spread eagle and American shield, with the national arms. In the centre of the bottom piece is the coat of arms of Pennsylvania, Mr. Buchanan's own State, it being designed to make this appropriate for each of the Presidents—Virginia for Jefferson, Louisiana for Taylor, New York for Fillmore, and so on. The four corner pieces represent the emblems of commerce, agriculture, manufactures, and the fine arts. The whole work is very striking, and reflects credit on Philadelphia's skill and taste.

PRICES FOR TOBACCO.—We learn from the Milton Chronicle, that the crops of tobacco raised by S. S. Harrison Esq., of Carroll County, N. C., were sold last week in Danville, Va., at forty dollars per hundred, for the home crop and twenty-five dollars per hundred for that raised on another plantation. These fine prices were paid—not as in some cases of brigades, for a handful of good tobacco, while the bulk of the lot went for scarcely anything at all—but for the entire crop, largely as well as top leaf.

NEED STEALING.—Cain A. Allen, of this District, has been committed to jail charged with the offense of negro stealing. Of the rumors in circulation in regard to this alleged theft we will not speak. The offence of negro stealing in this State is punishable by death, and it is a crime that always meets with a rigid investigation. We therefore abstain from saying anything calculated to injure or assist his case—his legal Star.

DEPLOREABLE OCCURRENCE.—On the 20th ult., the Japanese Ambassador was brought down to this city from Marsfield, by the United States steamer Active, which vessel fired a salute to the Japanese steamer Cambodiam, lying at the same pier. The wad from one of the guns struck Commodore Cunningham, who is in charge of the Navy Yard there, and injured him seriously. At one time it was thought he could not recover; now the physicians hope to save him and his sight; one of his eyes was much hurt, the other had been blind previously.—*Confidential paper.*
