### FREQUENT AND RESOLUTION

Adopted by resolution, the National Convention of the Constitutional Union Party, at Baltimore, May 10, 1860.

WISCONSIN. Expressions have demonstrated that we are opposed to the political Constitution of the country, and in the same time in which we oppose the people, and in the same time in which the political divisions of the country, by the creation and encroachment of geographical and sectional parties, increases.

Resolved. That it is both the just of patriotic duty, to reorganize our political principles after this.

The CONSTITUTION OF THE UNION,

AND THE REAPPOINTMENT OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL UNION DELEGATION.

And, as we are represented in the Constitutional Union Delegation, our National convention adjourned, we here pledge ourselves to maintain, protect and defend, represent, and unify, these great principles of public liberty and social equality, against all enemies, at home and abroad; believing thereby, may more honorably be resolved in the country, the just rights of the people and of the States re-established, and the Government again placed in their stations of justice, freedom, and safety; and, as we are also pledged to maintain, protect, and defend, our fathers, and especially those of the United States to make a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity.

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The Election—the Result.

Now that we can see our way clear, we have to acknowledge another defeat. The majority of Gov. Ellis will not reach more than 5,000, which is a decrease according to the Bragg and Gilmer vote of 7,000 and according to the Ellis and McRae vote of 11,000. Such another victory to the Democrats will diminish their majority entirely. In the last Legislature the Democrats had on joint basis 65 majority—now they will not have 25. With such a result, we think our friends have no excuse to complain.—With a clear majority of from 12 to 16,000 against us, and a new issue before the people, it is a wonder that we have done as well as we have, inasmuch as every advantage was taken of us.

We have every reason to believe if the question of Equal Taxation had been fairly discussed in every county, Mr. Pool would have been triumphantly elected; but it being a new issue and many of the people not understanding the question, they permitted themselves to be led away by their opponents. In the county of Burke, where we expected a gain, Col. Gaither made no arrangement with us, with W. W. Avery, Esq., not to contest the county. This was a most unfortunate arrangement for the Colonel, and to this he may attribute his defeat, although it was reported he had to contend against the Bank at Morganton and the Rail Road influence, and so apparent is the corruption that was used to defeat the Colonel, that his friends will endeavor to induce him, if possible, to contest the election.
