Ladies Aid Society.
The Ladies have recently organized a Ladies Aid Society, for the purpose of contributing to the necessities of our soldiers in Virginia. They are actively engaged in their benevolent enterprise, in which all are not only willing, but anxious to participate. The regular meetings are held every Wednesday at Carwin's Brick Building, with the power vested in the President—Mrs. W. H. Ripley—to call the Society together whenever necessary. The ladies cannot shoulder the burden and march to the field, but in their sphere they may do much to furnish the stores of war, and hold the hands of those who stand in the deadly breach on the perilous edge of battle. The ladies of Carolina are doing a noble work, and in so doing they are doing good.

We are authorized to return the thanks of the Society to Mr. J. D. Palmer for the basket of delicacies and good things which he sent them on Thursday last. While they were being dispatched with thankfulness and good appetites, the liberal donor was by no means forgotten. Who else will take the hint, and go and do likewise?

A generous emulation seems to inspire the ladies throughout the State, and to pervade all classes and conditions, in ministering to the comforts and necessities of those who have gone to defend our rights on the battle field. In our own immediate community, every effort is being made to add to the comforts of the Soldier who may have to contend with rigorous winter and a cruel and relentless foe upon the border.

Bishop Lynch's Letter.
The Right Rev. Bishop Lynch, of Charlotte, has addressed a very admirable letter to the Archbishop Hughes, of New York. We are pleased to learn the publication in the Herald, as it is a clear and able statement of causes which have led to the present wicked war. The length of the letter precludes our publishing it. "We invite for this paper an attentive perusal. The justice of our cause, and the responsibility of our civilization, stand forth in the most bold and graphic pen of Bishop Lynch, will contribute much towards removing the fanciful North that even exists in the minds of those who are unwilling to see the truth in their own bitter destruction."

The Editor of the Salisbury Democrat, writing to his paper from Alabama, Alabama, says:

In my last I spoke of Alabama as being ahead of the other Southern States in retaining and making preparations for the maintenance of these great principles of government upon which the stability of our Confederacy rests; but this, now that I have arrived at a more central point at which I can obtain more reliable information, I find to be a mistake. Alabama has not, one less any of the Cotton States, refused by example that service to which we have repeatedly been led to believe by propaganda and all of them would. North Carolina and Virginia are greatly ahead in their contributions both of men and money."
