## Ladies Aid Society.

The Ladies have recently organized a Ladies Aid Society, for the purpose of contributing to the necessities of our soldiers in Virginia. They are actively engaged in their benevolent enterprise, in which all who are willing but anxious to participate.

The regular meetings are held every Wednesday at Carson's Brick Building, with the power vested in the President—Mrs. W. H. Rynd—to call the Society together whenever necessary. The ladies cannot shoulder the musket and march to the field, but in their sphere they may do much to furnish the stores of war, and hold the hands of those who stand in the deadly breach on the perilous edge of battle. The ladies of Charlotte are doing a noble work, and in it we wish them God speed.

We are authorized to return the thanks of the Society to Mr. J. D. Palmer for the basket of delicacies and good things which he sent them on Thursday last. While they were being dispatched with thankfulness and good appetite, the liberal donor was by no means forgotten. Who else will take the bin, and go and do likewise!

## OBITUARY.

Died in Yorktown, Va., on the 5th of August last with infarction of the brain caused by a severe attack of Malaria, Mr. JOSEPH LEONARD, Esq., of our worthy citizen Robert Leonard, Esq., of this County, in the 21st year of his age.

Thus early in the freshness of his years, Mr. Leonard yielded up his life for his country. Although Mr. Leonard did not fall on the field of battle, yet he died at the post of honor and duty. Mr. Leonard was a member of the Charlotte Guards, and Capt. Ross informed the author of this notice who stood by him in his moments. That a brave soldier lived to witness the fight of great Bunker Hill must be himself a source of pride.

The deceased was a kind and amiable young man affectionate in disposition, who the respects and regards of all who knew him. His deportment was always in the family and social circles which never can be said to be, but he is gone. God has sent the messenger of death to bear his soul to the house of eternal rest.

Mr. Leonard's remains were sent to the hospital ground by the Charlotte Guards commanded by Capt. E. A. Ross, and then were interred with military honors.

The funeral services were conducted by Bishop Atkinson in a very fitting and solemn manner. The subject of his obituary, "Men that are born of a woman" is now and full of trouble.
