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UNJUSTIFIABLE ATTACK.

The Wilmington Messenger has attacked Gov. Fowle for traveling over the State so much and has spoken of him as the "junketing Governor." Such a reference as this is offensive. Junketing means feasting, drinking, dissipation, reveling, and the reverse of sober, conservative action. We know that Gov. Fowle has not touched a drop of liquor in twenty-five years. His habit are as good as those of the best man in the State and have always been. He has never left his office when public business demanded that he should remain there. An examination will show that he is up with all the work before him and that he has devoted more time to the duties of his office than any other Governor since the war.
