This Road Will Sell Cheap Tickets to Millions of Acres of Free Land to be Opened.

Early in May 3,000,000 acres of land of Cheyenne and Arapahoe reservations in India Territory will be thrown open to settlers. Those contemplating availing themselves of this opportunity to secure free homes will find the Baltimore and Ohio railroad the quickest route from any point in the East to the Indian Territory. Four trains daily from New York, Philadelphia, Chester, Wilmington, Baltimore, Washington, Cumberland, Wheeling, Pittsburg, and all intermediate stations. Under the efficient management of Mr. Mayer, the President and Mr. Chas. O. Scull, General Passenger Agent, the road has been changed in a most wonderful way. It was our pleasure a few days months ago to pass over this road and we found every thing that money and skill could do for the convenience and comfort of the traveling public. Fast vestibule cars provided with the comforts that make each passenger feel like a prince. In speaking of the President of the road and its rapid growth as one of the greatest thoroughfares of the country a paper recently said:

The extraordinary recovery of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in little more than four years from apparent insolvency to the declaration of a 20 per cent. stock dividend, or near 50 per cent. for every year of deferred dividends, the whole represented by cash or property added, attests both the vitality of the property and the efficiency of Charles F. Mayer, the President. He is understood to have been selected by Miss Mary Garrett, as the legatee of a very great stock interest in this property, to repair the damages of the past and raise the instrumentality to the standard of the best railroad civilization. The fact was that the old management took from the road both its earnings and its betterments and strained every thing to make a great dividend showing, issuing bonds where stock should have been issued. The stock is now with the stock dividend only \$180,000,000, while the clear profits of the company were alone \$2,000,000 last year, or 11 per cent. Mr. Mayer spent \$5,200,000 last year upon equipment, track and structures. The Pittsburg and Chicago Junction Line will be open next spring, making the shortest and most central and newest line from East to West. It may be asked who is Charles F. Mayer? He is the grandson of a Holland, Amsterdam, junior merchant, who came to Baltimore in 1784. This man was the Wurtemberg Consul-General also, and was descended from a mercantile family at Ulm, Germany. He had three sons, Lewis, Charles and Colonel Brantz Mayer, the second a lawyer, the latter an historian and regular army officer. Lewis Mayer, father of our railway President, went to universities in Europe, and returned to begin the development of large anthracite coal properties in Pennsylvania patrimonial in the family. He married at Lancaster, Penn., his cousin, Susan O. Mayer, daughter of a merchant and State Senator there. The son, Charles F. Mayer, married in 1866, Susan Douglas Keim, daughter of Hon. George

May Keim, of Reading, Penn. He became President of the Despard Coal Company, developed the gas-coal trade of Upper Maryland, and organized the Consolidated Coal Company, with 15,000 acres of land, much of it 10,000 tons to the acre. His success in this Cumberland field was so thorough that his success in the B. and O. Railroad has been merely enlightenment added to sagacity. A twentieth century man has replaced the old s'ave State, eighteenth century, ultra economist who wore out the spades digging for revenue without increment. In his youth Mr. Mayer was a supercharge to South America; after that a merchant and bank President, and his coal company had a capital of above \$10,000,000. Like Chauncey Depew, he is a man of refined tastes and connections. The Keims, his relatives, are powerful in the Reading Railroad. "Courtesy is better than acrimony" is the faith of the new President.
