DEMOCRATS IN COUNCIL.
THE COUNTY CONVENTION HELD
HERE THIS AFTERNOON.

The Ticket Named that Will sweep the Field—Weaverites and All.
Capt. E. J. Parrish was nominated temporary chairman. Congratulated the body on its representative appearance.

J. A. Robinson was requested to act as temporary secretary.
Every township was represented and it was an enthusiastic assembly.
Committees, one from each township, were appointed on permanent organization, resolutions and credentials.

The committee on permanent organization made the following report: Recommend W. P. Durham for permanent chairman, and W. M. Busbee, permanent secretary. The report was adopted.

While waiting, J. S. Manning and E. J. Parrish made short talks, urging every Democrat to go into the fight with a determination to win.

Committee on credentials reported that every township was represented, with no contests.

T. B. Fuller put in nomination F. D. Markham for Sheriff, and H. A. Reams moved that he be nominated by acclamation. This was carried and F. D. Markham was declared the nominee of the convention.

John Pope was nominated for Treasurer by acclamation.

Paschal Lunsford nominated for Register of Deeds by acclamation.

I. N. Link nominated for Surveyor by acclamation.

Dr. N. M. Johnson nominated for Coroner by acclamation.

At this juncture a recess was taken in order that the delegates might consult upon the nomination of a candidate for the Lower House of Representatives.

When the convention reassembled Mr. R. G. Russell nominated F. L. Fuller in an earnest and eulogistic speech which was received with warm applause. Capt. Peay seconded the nomination of Mr. Fuller. He said he had been a Democrat for 47 years and he never felt happier in a Democratic convention. He was nominated by acclamation, amid the greatest enthusiasm. He was called upon and made a short and forcible speech accepting the nomination.

The committee on resolutions through Mr. Carrington, reported as follows:
RESOLVED, That this Convention ratifies the State and National platforms of the Democratic party and declares the only safety of the people and the only means of relief from their burdens to be in steadfast devotion the principles and nominees of that party.

RESOLVED, That we deeply sympathize with his immediate family and with the people of the State in the death of the spotless judge and incorruptible man, the Honorable Joseph J. Davis.

J. S. Manning was elected chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee.

Delegates elected to the State Convention to nominate an Associate Justice, when it is called: Joseph Tilley, A. C. Parham, J. F. Cain, Jr., W. P. Durham, J. E. Suit, John C. Patterson, W. W. Fuller, J. S. Manning, R. B. Boone, Junius Parker, F. L. Fuller, W. M. Busbee.

A motion was passed instructing the chairman to appoint fifteen delegates to the 17 Senatorial district convention when it was called. The chair announced the following delegates: W. H. Hopsan, Le Roy Page, J. S. Carr, S. R. Carrington, Julius Parker, Lucius Green, J. T. Pinnix, Benehan Cameron, W. D. Lunsford, E. G. Russell, J. G. Latta, A. P. Stroud, J. I. Crutchfield, J. T. Nichol, W. R. Lyon.

The business of the convention being completed Hon. A. H. A. Williams was called on and responded, discussing the issues of the day.

We have no space to discuss at length the conglomerated mess, or in other words, the political hash that was stewed in Raleigh Tuesday and set before the people of North Carolina as a dainty dish. It savors too much of the common old enemy we have been fighting all the time. It was a beautiful sight to see Loge Harris and half a dozen other prominent Republicans assisting vigorously in making the ticket and dictating to the People's party, the masses of whom are yet too blind to see where they are being led. As the State Chronicle says:

"The people of North Carolina will not lick the hand that smited them in the hour of misfortune. They may be poor, but they are brave and honest and grateful, and will not turn their backs on those who have been faithful to their interest and true in their devotion alike in days of adversity and prosperity. The hour for parleying has passed. It was too long an hour anyhow. Democrats must stand four square to every political wind that blows, and victory will be theirs."

THERE is a well defined field of usefulness for campaign clubs. Democrats should determine without delay to invade the field and do service to the cause. But let each club rank it twenty instead of two, and make the victory impressive and emphatic.
