### AN EXPOSURE OF THE GAME.

Dalby's Game "Showed" Up by W. T. Adams at Wilkins. The Oxford Day of Thursday says: W. T. Adams, who is one of the most prominent farmers of Granville county and a member of the last legislature and until recently a leading man in the Third party, made a speech to a good size crowd at Wilkins Saturday night.

Mr. Adams stated that while he was still for the reforms demanded by the Omaha platform, he had found out there was no chance to obtain them through the Third party. He said that Dr. A. J. Dalby told him that all he (Dalby) was after was to get two hundred men in this county, who have heretofore affiliated with the Democratic party, to vote the Third party ticket at the approaching election, and with that number he would defeat the Democrats and elect the Republicans.

Immediately after learning that this was their scheme, Mr. Adams withdrew from the Third party. He said he knew what Republicanism was—that instead of promising to help the people out of their troubles the radicals had in view measures to pile on heavier burdens. He believes in white supremacy and honest government, and he told his friends that their only hope of relief for the farmers from the legislative ill under which they suffer is through the Democratic party.

Mr. Adams' speech created a sensation and was repeatedly and heartily cheered.

### THE CEDAR FORK RE-UNION.

600 People Present and 108 Old Veterans.

Yesterday was a memorable day at Cedar Fork. It was the last reunion of North Carolina Grays, Company I, 6th N. C. Regiment. Sixty-seven of this company, that numbered 120 men thirty years ago, are now living and thirty-one were present at this re-union.

With these old war-scarred veterans there assembled yesterday at Cedar Fork some five hundred people to participate in a re-union and the return of the colors from Col. T. W. Higgins, 28th Ohio Regiment.

One hundred and eight Confederate veterans, headed by the Durham band, formed upon the old drill ground and marched to the stand that had been erected on one portion of the grounds. In the procession they bore the stars and stripes.

The exercises opened with prayer by Rev. C. D. Holman. Mrs. F. L. Lowe, on behalf of Col. Higgins, represented the colors of the company to the living survivors of that company. She is the only living survivor of the ladies who were instrumental in having the flag made. Her address was very touching, and spoke of the struggles they endured, while the boys were on tented fields. She spoke in a very patriotic manner of the return of the flag by Col. Higgins.

Lt. D. C. Gunter, for the company, received it in a very neat speech recounting the trials of the company and the territory over which the flag went.

Maj. R. W. York delivered the historical address. He spoke for something like an hour and a quarter. It was full of reminiscences of the career of the company, and he gathered up many interesting facts connected with that memorable time.

Sergeant C. L. Williams, called the roll for the last time. Out of 120, thirty-one answered "here."

Here then was an intermission and dinner. A table was specially prepared for the veterans and the others ate in picnic fashion.

In the afternoon Maj. R. W. York tendered the colors to the State, and the flag was received by Col. Eugene Harrell. The "Conquered Banner" was read by Lt. M. B. Barbee, after which short addresses were made by J. C. Birdsong and Capt. J. S. Lockhart.

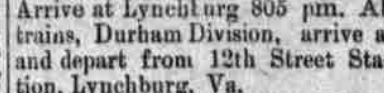
