STATE NEWS.

Washington Progress: The case against the Bath rioters was completed yesterday. Wiley Pitts and Charles Stewart entered a submission. The jury found a verdict of guilty against the others, George Whitehead, Frank Clark and D. F. Havens. The court had not passed judgment upon them at this writing. It is not a penitentiary offense, however, and they will get off with a term in the county jail.

Raleigh Press: John B. McCormack, an intelligent looking white man was brought to the penitentiary today from Kobson county to serve out a 15 years sentence for manslaughter. He is said to worth good property and to have come of a very good family.

The number of persons who were brought here by the railroads for May 20th ceremonies is now known accurately, and was 16,900. The Visitor's estimate was 15,000.—Raleigh Visitor.

Dr. Dwight M. Styron, a young man of this city, who, a few weeks ago, began to learn the machinists trade at the A. & N. C. R. R. shops met with the misfortune yesterday of getting three fingers of his right hand caught in the cogs of a machine at which he was working. They were mangled so that Drs. Duguid and Primrose, who dressed the hand, had to remove the first joint of one finger. It is expected to save the others. Mr. Styron has the sympathy of his friends, and they are glad that the results were no worse.—New Berne Journal.

Boston has a unique exhibition in the shape of lilacs, which is probably the largest ever seen in this country. The collection contains from 125 to 150 varieties of Syringa vulgaris, which have been obtained from all parts of the world. The display includes every known species of this fragrant flower in cultivation.
