Guiltily Punished and the Innocent Released.

BROOKS AND KITCHEN SPEAK

In Surry County Court House Tuesday at Noon.

Mt. Airy, Sept. 1.—In the Surry county court house at Dobson to-day W. W. Kitchin, Democratic candidate for Governor, and A. L. Brooks, candidate for Congress in the fifth district, formally opened the regular campaign by vigorous speeches to a packed court house of seven hundred men and women, attracted from all sections of the county. The attendance, considering the recent floods and active work in delayed saving of the tobacco and fodder crops by the farmers of this agricultural county, is considered by local authority as most propitious of Democratic success.

Mr. Kitchin spoke first and dealt largely with State affairs, contrasting strongly the professions of the Republican platform for the people's interest by nominating as its candidate for Governor Mr. Cox, a clever gentleman but a typical representative of interests now known to be conducted without regard to the general welfare. His discussion of national affairs was exhaustive and able, showing up the insincerity of national Republican leaders in professing to desire the adoption of measures advocated by Bryan, while running a candidate nominated by Federal office-holders of the South, who faced one way East, another West, but whose campaign was being supplied with funds by the great monopolies and trusts whom the President cried aloud against, but whose only weapon had been words.

Mr. Brooks spoke but a few minutes yet thoroughly aroused the audience by a fine presentation of Democratic principals as compared with Republican practices. The county has been three hundred strong Republican, and many Republicans were present, it being noted that no one left the audience during the two hours discussion, and strictest attention was paid to every word spoken by the candidates, the applause being hearty and frequent. The signs to-day, say local leaders, are most favorable for a Democratic majority in Surry this year. Both candidates were well received and expressed gratification at this their first formal appearance since the Republican convention named its candidates at Charlotte.

Mr. Kitchin crosses the Blue Ridge to-night to speak at Sparta Wednesday, thence touring the counties across the mountains.

A Quiet Wedding.

Miss Margaret Emma Brown was united in marriage to Mr. E. H. Dinkelbiller at her home Tuesday evening. The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. R. Leyburn, pastor of the First Presbyterian church.

They will make their home in Durham, and for the present have taken rooms with the brides mother. The groom is a traveling man with headquarters here.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION SEPTEMBER 2.

W. G. Bramham for the Legislature— Campaign Matters Discussed.

The republican county executive committee met in the office of Messrs. Giles & Sykes last night and the most important matter was the decision of the date for the county convention, which will nominate all county officers.

Quite a number of prominent Republicans were present and plans for the coming campaign were discussed. The county convention was called to meet September the 2d, at which time a full ticket will be put in the field.

Among the candidates possibly Mr. W. G. Bramham is the most likely for the legislature. In fact since the recent campaign for prohibition, in which Mr. Bramham is credited with a victory for the wets, there has been much favorable talk of sending him to the legislature by Republicans. No other candidate has been mentioned in this connection.

This cannot be said of the candidates for the office of sheriff, but the most prominent, or rather the most likely candidate is Mr. J. B. Warren, while Messrs. Jack Barbee, W. E. Neal and Hal Wilkins have been mentioned in this connection.

Candidates for the other county offices have not received much consideration, in fact who they will be does not seem to have been discussed. Saturday week will determine the men that are to carry the Republican banner in the coming campaign and there is much interest as to the ticket that will be put out.

Nothing Was Found Out.

Friday afternoon, August 14th, Mayor Graham had Messrs. A. E. Lloyd, J. C. Michie, W. J. Griswold and W. B. Guthrie summoned before him to testify regarding the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors in the city of Durham. The matter was then carried over until Monday to be heard before Judge Jones. The court set Thursday night for the hearing, and it took place in Mayor Graham's office last night.

Some of the questions were answered, but Messrs. Winston & Bryant, attorneys for the above named, objected and their contention was sustained and the matter went off the record with no knowledge gained, and for the present the matter will rest.

A Child Dead.

The 18-months-old child of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Markham, of West Durham, died at the home of its parents Tuesday of the croup.

The funeral and burial took place Wednesday afternoon, the burial being in the Proctor burying ground.
