RESULT OF ELECTION IN COUNTY AND STATE

Three Republican Congressmen and Bryan's Majority Will Be Less Than 20,000

BROOKS' DEFEAT ONE OF THE SURPRISES OF THE DAY

Nemocrats Lose in the Fifth, Eighth and Tenth Districts. Durham Democrtic by Varying Majorities.--Harward Leads the County Ticket.

The result of the election in North Carolina was what some say they expected, but many had been led to believe that the State would send a solid Democratic Congress to Washington. However, this will not be the case as the Fifth, Eighth and Tenth Districts will be represented by Republicans.

Brooks, in the Fifth district, was defeated by \$45 votes majority for Morehead. Charles H. Cowles, Republican of the eighth district, was elected with a majority of 1,800 over Hackett. John G. Grant, Republican, won out over W. T. Crawford in the tenth district with a majority of 355. All other congressmen elected were Democrats.

The entire state ticket was elected by Democrats, the majorities ranging from 20,000 for Bryan to 42,000 for Kitchin.

A. L. BROOKS DEFEATED.

Fifth Congressional District.

The friends of Hon. A. L. Brooks were disappointed when it was learned that he was defeated for congress by his opponent, John M. Morehead. The official vote has not yet decided. but all indications are that he is defeated by more than a hundred majority.
