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The home of Mr. J. A. Allen, of West Durham, was saddened a few days ago by the death of his little grand-daughter, Bessie May Allen.

Mr. V. S. Bryant appearing for the prosecution took the serious ground that the girl must be in trouble and that there is evidence that she has been threatened. It was brought out that he owns a pistol and a small thirst for firewater. From the father and the girl it was learned that Tilley has sent other letters and that this is not the first time that she has had cause to be alarmed at what he has done. He said the girl was entitled to the protection of the law and that she asked for it.

Mr. H. A. Foushee took the matter more or less as a joke. He said the fellow had always been friendly to the family and that if he had bought cartridges for the purpose of killing John Ashley's daughter, he would hardly have sent for them by John. He brought out the fact that Ashley did not purchase the fireworks as requested and that nothing could have been sillier than his purchasing them through such a medium.

He maintained that Tilley could not have written the letter, that it was in clear, round hand and and the work of someone more able to write than Tilley. He insisted that the girl was unnecessarily alarmed and that the prisoner should be discharged. He believed the letter is a joke and said the girl made no report of Tilley's strange doings until she had found the letter sticking in the corner of the house.

Magistrate Harris took the view that there was probable cause and bound the defendant over in a bond of \$750.

When arrested Tilley was at a corn shucking. He was caught in his overalls and brought here without chance to get his witnesses if he has any. He says he can prove that he was at Rich Blalock's the night of the alleged scare and that he will do so when he gets back home.

When the firemen answered the first call early Friday evening smoke was issuing on Main street in front of the postoffice and the flames were making their appearances from the roof and firemen kept busy until about 11 o'clock in order to be sure there were no chance of smouldering embers rekindling. The destruction up to this time had been mainly in the Holladay studio, which proved to be a total loss to Mr. Holladay.

The estimated loss to Mr. Holladay is about \$7,000 or \$8,000 with no insurance. In the spring the ownership of the Holladay studio underwent some change that made void the insurance and Mr. Holladay was not aware of the fact, or failed to have his insurance properly arranged and the loss by fire falls heavily upon him. However, he arrived in the city Saturday from Lynchburg, Va., and will go to work at once to rebuild his business and will soon be in position to make photos for the public in his usual artistic style.

The origin of both fires is a mystery. The first fire occurred early in the evening and the store of Trakas & Co. was not affected at all, but the origin of the latter fire is said to have been from some other cause than sparks from the first.

The total loss by the two fires will be between \$15,000 and \$18,000 with possibly \$10,000 insurance.

SMALL FIRE IN HAYTI.

The fire companies were called out Monday to Hayti, where a small frame building, the residence of Alex Moore, was on fire. Prompt work soon had the fire out, when it was discovered that another house some distance away was burning, the brisk wind carrying sparks from the first fire. The firemen began the work of extending the hose

five before the entire house was burned.

The total loss of the two fires was about \$1,000 with some insurance.

The information was brought to the officers and Goodloe was placed in jail, while the woman was carried to Lincoln hospital.

The case was to have been tried Saturday, but was postponed to await the development of the condition of the woman in the hospital, who is said to be in a serious condition. The treatment the woman received at the hands of her husband was said to be brutal in the extreme, and from her condition it was a case of attempt to end her life.

The child came to Durham about ten days before on a visit with her mother, Mrs. J. J. Allen. Diphtheria developed and she died on the exact date of her father's death two years ago.

The child was exceptionally bright for one of only six years and in the Sunday schools she was a favorite of the teachers and the taught. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. O. W. Triplett and the burial followed in Maplewood.

Officers captured six gamblers on Sugar Hill about two o'clock Sunday morning and locked them up in jail to appear before the mayor. There were eight in the party but two of them escaped.
