Death of Mrs. Williams.

J. F. Williams, who has been ill four days with pneumonia died yesterday evening at her home, Mrs. Beavers, who is also at her door with pneumonia.

Her sisters are the last of the family reared in Chatham county and they were devoted to each other. They were taken sick at the same time and the doctor doesn't know of the cause in the household.

Williams was sixty-four years of age and spent most of her life in Chatham. Her husband died two years ago and she lived with her son in Durham.

Ms. Beavers, the oldest sister, lost her husband and the two had determined to live together all of their lives.

They were members of the Baptist church and attended services at Mt. Pisgah church where the funeral services will be held today.

The preliminary service will be held this evening at 8:30 and the body will be borne to the old home and buried at 2 o'clock this morning. Rev. W. S. Olive is expected to conduct the service.

Williams leaves an only son, Mr. W. O. Williams, with whom she lived at her sister's home.

Will Preside Over Recorder's Court for Two Years More.
